

Belvedere Elementary School is helping all students develop the world class skills, knowledge, and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by providing a safe, caring, and academically challenging learning environment. We envision our school as a place to “Live, Love, Learn, and Leave a Legacy.” At Belvedere, we accomplish this by accepting no excuses, showing growth for all students in our care, and having one mission: developing citizenship, leadership, and higher order thinking skills. We demonstrate our mission and vision daily by engaging and challenging our students and by the continuous professional development of our teachers and staff. To ensure our students are developing world-class knowledge and skills, our teachers are always seeking to learn new and effective strategies to use in the classroom such as: Guided Math, Fountas & Pinnell guided reading benchmark and intervention system, science kits, small group instruction, school-wide writing plan, reading coach and Reading Recovery. Teachers at Belvedere were awarded over \$5,000 in grant funds this year to enhance the learning environment and include STEM activities in their lessons. We are proud of our strong history of academic success. At Belvedere Elementary we also have various programs designed to focus on the life and career skills students need to be productive citizens. Examples of how we have embedded citizenship and leadership include service clubs such as student council, safety patrol, and guidance programs. For instance, our guidance counselor taught character lessons in every grade level during classroom guidance, she worked with peer conflict resolution groups, and conducted student interest groups. Our art teacher taught students about persistence and determination in the creative process by working with them to create and install playground murals for grounds beautification. We also partnered with numerous community members to provide social-development clubs for students including an etiquette club, “positive boys and girls” clubs, and others such as chess, creative writing, and running club. Examples of ways we attend to the holistic needs of students include continued partnerships with Golden Harvest Food Bank’s backpack program to provide access to nutritious food over weekends and holidays and Laces for Love to provide new shoes and socks to needy students. Finally, to help connect all of the knowledge, skills, and characteristics our students need to be competitive, we have incorporated extensive classroom and hand-held technology into our school environment. At Belvedere Elementary School, we believe all of our stakeholders share in creating our future South Carolina Graduates. We appreciate your support as we work together to leave a positive legacy. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






KNOWLEDGE
