
Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by ...

Fairfax Elementary School is committed to laying a solid foundation. The faculty and staff, along with community members, are working collaboratively to provide our students with the academic, social, technological, and emotional support that is needed to educate the whole child. The mission of Fairfax Elementary School is to prepare students to become competent, responsible individuals by providing a safe learning environment where cultural differences are recognized, respected, and celebrated; and to provide realistic educational experiences. Our students are actively engaged in a rigorous curriculum, learning life-long character skills, and participating in activities that will allow them to be College and Career Ready. Throughout the school day, very little to no instructional time is lost. The Literacy Coach assists the teachers with planning, preparing, and finding resources for the execution of their lessons. Periodically, the teachers and Literacy Coach meet in our wonderfully organized, print-rich Literacy Closet. Teachers are able to check-out leveled readers, reading kits, drama boxes, Reading Assessments, and other resources for Reading. For the 2014 - 2015 school year, our students participated in and will continue to be taking part in numerous educational experiences including the spelling bee, school plays, Accelerated Reader Program, Science Fair, Academic-Based Field Trips, and many other valuable learning opportunities. Parents, community, and board members are welcomed into the school to volunteer or simply monitor the learning environment. With the help of our guidance counselor, our students participated in several Service Learning Projects that included, but is not limited to, canned food drive, Pennies for Patients, and Valentine Ball fundraiser. A residential artist, William Martin, provided scripts, customs, and props for two school plays. The talented students of Fairfax Elementary School performed the following plays, "The Legend of Sleepy Hollow" and "Cinderella." The after school program provided a safe learning environment after normal school hours. This school has a plethora of initiatives, incentives, and activities for our students to participate in. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






