Our teachers are always seeking to learn new and effective strategies to use in the classroom such as Reading Recovery, Voyager Reading Program, Primary Grades Academy, science kits, elementary reading and math interventionist, Wilson's Foundations, Reading Soul Mates, Lucy Calkins Writing, and Scholastic Leveled Readers. We are fortunate to have a full time Bridge Professional Development Coordinator who helps our teachers develop, monitor and implement their personal professional growth plans. We are proud of our students as they continue to grow and show gains throughout the curriculum.


We also have various programs outside the academic world to develop the whole child. Our students participate in an arts-infused curriculum, giving them opportunities to participate in art, dance, drama, choral, piano, drums, strings, and guitar. Our students displayed their talents through four Student Showcases and our annual Talent Show. Our guidance counselor implements a Character Education program and conducts small-group and classroom guidance on topics such as bullying, friendship, conflict resolution, self-esteem and respect. We also created a student council and the students learn how local government operates and supports the needs of the community. Our students have given back to the community by collecting funds for Toys for Tots and American Heart Association and sponsoring a can food drive for the Salvation Army. Finally, we continue to offer Breakfast in the Classroom, which ensures that all students have a healthy breakfast. We received a grant for Fresh Fruit and Vegetables, where all students received fresh fruits or vegetables each afternoon as their afternoon snack.

The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






