

WORLD CLASS SKILLS & LIFE AND CAREER CHARACTERISTICS

Grassy Pond Elementary School teachers, staff and administrators worked throughout 2014 -2015 as a team, to inspire, motivate and equip students with the learning experiences they need to develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate. The school continued to work with community stakeholders in an attempt to provide as many opportunities for all students to be successful. Local churches, colleges and business partners volunteered time and resources to help support and foster learning. Our PTO planned several successful fund raisers this year as well as provided incentives for students and after school activities to help build a positive community atmosphere. Field trips were planned strategically to support lessons being taught in the classroom. This enables students to make life connections with their learning. In addition to academics Grassy Pond helped students build life skills through our Character Education program. In this program valuable character traits are taught on a monthly basis and students are rewarded for exhibiting these traits. Several new programs were put in place this year to aid students instructionally. Grassy Pond incorporated Accelerated Reader and STAR testing to help with our classroom reading instruction. LLI was introduced into our small group intervention. Teachers analyzed student data continually throughout the year and used this data to differentiate instruction according to student's needs. Teachers and staff participate in meaningful staff development to transform teaching at GPES and meet the needs of 21st Century learners. Teachers eagerly participate in book studies, conferences and share outs regarding current trends in teaching, learning and technology. Our students were awarded numerous recognitions, from their many accomplishments, throughout this school year. The GPES school family has enjoyed celebrating these successes along with them. The following highlight some of those accomplishments: one student scored perfect on PASS ELA; three students scored perfect on PASS Math; Martin Luther King Jr. Art and Essay Contest Winners; Regional Science Fair Winner; District Free-Throw Contest Winners; District Young Writer's Gala Award Winners; Award Winning Lego Robotics Team; and First Place Campo Giorno Team. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






