

We strive to keep our staff abreast of the best research-proven instructional strategies through continuous professional development. Our teachers are always seeking to learn new and effective strategies to use in the classroom such as: differentiated instruction, integrated literacy practices, Response to Intervention for English Language Arts, small group guided reading, interactive read alouds, and support from a Reading Interventionist and Literacy Coach. Our instructional practices are based on student data, teacher observations, and analyzing student work. Our instruction is founded on students' needs. We are proud of our strong history of academic success. We are honored to have been named a Title I Distinguished School in 2014. At Jefferson Elementary we also have various programs outside the academic world to focus on the development of the whole child. Schoolwide we have focused character education through guidance classes and in the classroom. Students participate in Relay for Life, fundraise for March of Dimes and St. Jude's, and collect donations for the community. Students learn about possible careers and jobs throughout the year. Our primary teachers use Labor Day as a platform to discuss different jobs that are interesting to their students. Students dress as someone in their chosen career on the Friday before Labor Day. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






