
Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by ...

Our teachers are always seeking ways to improve classroom instruction through staff development, course work, book studies, data analysis, and self-reflection. Among other things, our teachers use Lucy Calkins Writing Units of Study, Science kits, small group guided reading, writing workshop, integration of Social Studies with ELA, teacher/student conferences, Fountas and Pinnell Reading Assessment / Planning tool, MAP data, and running records. At McBee Elementary School, we believe in developing the whole child as we guide them down the path of becoming prepared for society and the workplace. We strive to develop all students intellectually and socially. This year, many of our students worked at the McBee Soup Kitchen, sang in nursing homes, raised money for Pennies For Patients, gave to The United Way, and participated in numerous other service opportunities for students to learn how to give back and better serve their communities. For social development, our guidance counselor meets regularly with all classes to discuss how to handle numerous situations to include bullying, manners, and peer pressure. In addition, she meets individually with students who need her help outside of the regularly scheduled guidance block. Additionally, she oversees "Terrific Kids", our "Watch Dog" male mentor program, and "Hunger Busters" Friday backpacks. At McBee Elementary School, we believe the future of our community will be determined by the education our students receive. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






