


Our teachers meet weekly in cluster meetings to enhance their ability to present lessons using research-based strategies, analyze data, and become more reflective in order to effect change in the classroom. Our teachers continue to strive to learn effective and innovative strategies to use in their classroom such as small group guided reading and math, First in Math, science kits, technology integrated lessons, and collaborative lessons. Our teachers instill a positive work ethic within the children from an early age so that they will be ready to persevere through the rigorous standards in language arts and math for college and career readiness.

At HES we also have various programs that focus on the development of the whole child such as : Whole Brain Strategies, collaboration, creativity, and interpersonal skills. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






