
Scranton Elementary School's students, teachers, staff and parents had a rewarding and successful school year. Our students were provided with a variety of educational experiences revolving around the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate. These experiences were used to prepare our students to be college and career ready. We provided World Class Knowledge opportunities for our students through rigorous lessons based on the SC Language Arts and Math standards. Technology was incorporated into lessons to enhance student learning through the use of the Classworks program, Moby Max, Reading Counts, Voyager, and other computer based programs along with interactive lessons on the promethean boards. We added hands-on activities in Math and lab-like lessons in Science through STEM activities. We offered learning of World Class Skills through creative projects and creative writing assignments. We encouraged and supported creativity through competitive projects for Arbor Day, National History Day, and Ron McNair day. Critical thinking and problem solving were incorporated into lessons in all subjects. Our involvement in the National Junior Beta Club convention allowed students to collaborate through various competitions such as Living Literature. We taught various strategies for student use so they knew how to learn and figure things out for themselves in reading and math. Our students were provided numerous opportunities to develop Life and Career Characteristics through embedded character education. High expectations for behavior also allowed us to foster growth in the area of character education. The students participated in several community service projects These projects included Pennies for Patients which required students to individually collect for a good cause, March of Dimes which required friendly competitions and enhanced interpersonal skills, Breast Cancer Awareness to give the idea of what it truly means to persevere, Jump Rope for Heart that required students to have a strong and devoted work ethic, and St. Jude Math-a-Thon. Our kids took pride in helping others and making a difference. A strong family and community partnership was maintained throughout the school year through our Open House, Family Nights, Dad's Day, Mom's Day, Fall Festival, Celebration Day, Field Day, Family Day, Walk a Mile Day, Read across America Day, Math Night, and Incentive days. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



ACT Readiness Levels






KNOWLEDGE
