
Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by ...

In Genius Hour, students utilize one hour a week to complete research in an area of their personal interest and learn perseverance, good work ethic and self-direction at the same time. We enjoyed numerous honors this year. The SC chapter of the National School Public Relations Association’s Rewards for Excellence program honored Pine Tree Hill with four awards for our website, photographs, a promotional video, and our electronic weekly newsletter—The Bullpup Bulletin. Pine Tree Hill was also recognized by our business partner, Camden Wal-Mart, for having the most participation in the store’s Pack a Bus Challenge. We also had the most participation in The Clinic Classic Run and had five students recognized nationally by Classworks for the most logged hours with mastery. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






