Meadow Glen Elementary School is helping all students develop the world-class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by creating a high-performing school that effectively motivates everyone to be self-directed, serve others and become leaders in a global society. Our vision to see, hear and experience life from various angles motivates us to explore the world around us through many learning opportunities and rigorous standards for students, teachers and administrators.

All certified teachers participated in a year-long study of inquiry-based instruction. Teachers used this training to develop quality units of study that they use to teach students how to learn through asking and answering high-level questions, explorations and rigorous state standards. Teachers provide learning opportunities for students to create, think critically, solve problems collaboratively, communicate ideas with authentic audiences and research information through the use of technology. Expeditionary Learning will be our focus for the upcoming academic year.

As we develop global citizens, Chinese is taught in our Mandarin Immersion Program, starting in kindergarten. Spanish is taught in grades three through five through the Lexington One Language Acquisition Program. Our school counselors expose our students to various careers through Vehicle Day for students in kindergarten through grade two and Career Day for students in grades three through five.


We offer morning activities that students may attend before instruction begins, such as fitness, technology, First in Math, art, science in the STEM lab, discovery centers, literacy book clubs and computer science coding. Many students also participate in afternoon running clubs, band, Math Olympiads and chorus.

We use a schoolwide Positive Behavior Intervention and Support (PBIS) system. Students are taught the 7 Habits of an Effective Leader as strategies to demonstrate positive behavior in all areas of our school. We believe elementary students should be taught explicit 21st century language, such as self-directed learner, global citizen, perseverance, integrity, leadership, digital citizenship, growth mindset, service and care, collaboration, creativity, critical thinking and communication.

Community building is very important at MGES. The Parent Teacher Organization and the School Improvement Council work hand in hand with faculty and staff to provide family night events, school improvements and connections with the outside community.

The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






