We have had an incredible year at Sheridan Elementary. Sheridan houses 528 students in pre-kindergarten through 5th grade. It is our belief that we are all stakeholders in the educational lives of every student. Through innovative and challenging educational experiences, we strive to meet the individual needs of all students at Sheridan. Opportunities for students are abundant at Sheridan Elementary School. Students have access to computers in labs and in classrooms, as well as the use of StarBoards. All third through fifth grade students received iPad this year. Students used the iPad at home and school to enhance learning. Voyager, our school-wide intervention program, is one of the ways we ensure no child is left behind. Students have their individual learning needs addressed and met in math and reading intervention through this program. Our Professional Learning Community (PLC) includes reviews of student work, student achievement data analysis, implementation of effective instructional practices, and reviews of current research. Since formal education is based on the premise that students learn as a direct result of classroom instruction, our teachers implement Explicit Direct Instruction (EDI). EDI helps teachers deliver effective lessons that can significantly improve achievement for all learners. We also have maintained our partnership with the Twenty-First Century Afterschool Program which incorporated STEM lessons (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) for students. Our active Parent Teacher Association and School Improvement Council continue to support our instructional program. Students serve the community through a variety of service learning projects, which includes but is not limited to, Thanksgiving Food Drive, Relay for Life, March of Dimes, and Pennies for Patients. Through the hard work and dedication of our students, staff, and parents, Sheridan Elementary "Home of the Super Stars" continues to be a great place for our students



The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






