


Riverview Elementary School believes in "Children First" and our highly qualified staff focuses on an instructional program which emphasizes individualized learning and active student involvement in the learning process. As a result of this goal, we were recently awarded the Palmetto Gold Award for student achievement. Traditionally the student population at Riverview Elementary School has had limited growth because of the attendance area that it serves. However, even with the recent downturn in the economy and housing industry, Fort Mill has continued to experience positive student population growth. Riverview has experienced unprecedented fluctuations in our student population numbers due to the enrollment caps that were placed on two neighboring schools in our district. Also due to the extraordinary growth at our neighboring high schools the voters of the area passed a bond referendum that allowed for construction of a new Riverview Elementary School. Fort Mill High School will expand into our previous elementary school building. We were allowed to move into the "New" Riverview Elementary School over our winter break in December of 2015. Our mid-year move allowed our staff, students and parents a variety of opportunities for collaboration and team work. Our student council helped to develop a communication plan that we shared with stake holders. This plan allowed us to disseminate information about the move and help solve problems as they occurred. Our school community was able to collaborate with multiple entities such as Fort Mill High School, churches, our PTO, etc. With the mid-year move we were able to develop and assess our safety plans as a school community. This was done cooperatively with parents, staff, students and community members to assure that we are prepared for any crisis situation while ensuring students the opportunity to continue to grow socially, behaviorally, and academically. Our students have the opportunity for learning outside of the classroom as well. Our "WHISK" (We Help Include Special Kids) group works with students in our school who have special needs. Our student body works with the Fort Mill Care Center, the Humane Society, and other care groups for the community. Our children can participate in groups that offer input for the school as well, such as the Go Green Group, the STARS (students taking a responsibility at school), the Nutrition Group, Safety Patrol, the Environmental club and others. As a result of these and other programs we are developing leaders with a strong work ethic, among both our staff and our students. Riverview Elementary believes that all children can learn with the input and support of all stakeholders. Our focus is on individualized instruction which actively engages all students. These types of learning experiences will give students the foundation needed for success. We appreciate all of the support that we received during the move into our new, beautiful school and look forward to our first full year. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






