


The 2014-2015 school year was an exceptionally busy one for students and faculty at Laurens District 55 High School. Mrs. Sonya Bryant in her second year as principal, hosted the annual off-campus retreat for faculty members. During this retreat the faculty began planning for the new year. We are elated to report that our graduation rate improved 5.9 percentage points which denotes one of the greatest increases in our state's history. This year we also planned several end of the year celebrations to highlight graduation. This year our school was able to hire a full-time instructional coach. Under her direction the faculty spent much time in teacher-driven professional development which included but was not limited to the development of student learning objectives, pre and post test administration and targeted student achievement improvement. Another positive addition to our school family this year was the inclusion of a full time nurse assistant and part-time graduation coach. We also spent quality time in professional development with our sister-school Clinton High School. LDHS also received support from our district to provide all ninth and tenth graders with Google Chromebooks. Teachers spent much time training on how to effectively use these for classroom instruction. This year was also the first year of The Carolina Alliance for Technology (CAT) program. This is a federally funded program that will offer our students opportunities for real work experience in STEM career fields that will culminate in apprenticeships, college course work and industry-recognized certifications. Through this grant we also instituted the AVID program in our school. Mrs. Kelly Weldy served as teacher of the year for Laurens District High School. She represented the educators in our school in an exceptional manner. Finally, we proudly announce the Class of 2015 earned in excess of 3.7 million dollars in scholarship funds. This year was a year of growing and learning for all at LDHS. We look forward to discovering where knowledge gained this year will take us in the future. Sonya M. Average ACT Score Achieved by Students: Writing



ACT benchmarks are scores on the ACT subject-area tests that represent the level of achievement required for students to have a 50% chance of obtaining a B or higher or about a 75% chance of obtaining a C or higher in corresponding credit-bearing first-year college courses.

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
