

Allendale-Fairfax Middle School (AFMS) serves approximately 200 students in grades seven and eight. We are committed to providing a safe and nurturing environment that promotes academic success for all students. The faculty and staff work diligently to provide a safe, standards-driven, and student-focused environment. We continue to set high expectations for our students in the areas of academics, creativity, athletics, character development, and social growth. During the 2014 - 2015 School year, the middle and high school implemented a one-to-one I-Pad initiative. Our Title I funds were used to decrease class size, increase home/school communication and parent involvement, and provide professional development for teachers.

Our EOCT's resulted again in tremendous success. Our Algebra 1 scores increased from a 93% to 100% passage rate. Our English 1 scores remained at 100%. Our students partnered with the TRIO program at South Carolina State University. They also had the opportunity to experience various field study outings to colleges and career centers. We have continued to focus on implementing a school-wide STEM program that will provide our students with opportunities to be successful in a rigorous academic environment while developing 21st learning skills and incorporating the knowledge, skills, and characteristics of the Profile of the SC Graduate. Each student has an opportunity to have their own I-Pad. We have two stationary computer labs, one Pitsco lab, and several I-Pad carts. Students are recognized for academics at quarterly honors and awards ceremonies. To socially enrich our students, we are continuing to refine our positive behavior incentive program as well as a mentoring program to help our students become mature individuals. While the major challenge at AFMS remains closing the achievement gap, we are dedicated to working tirelessly to reach our students. Parents and community members are encouraged and invited to participate in our school improvement process. AFMS does offer parent and community participation in the School Improvement Council, our school has worked to establish and strengthen community ties in an effort to improve our school and benefit our students. As we conclude another year, our new school motto is "On the Prowl to Excellence". The entire faculty and staff are committed to the school's motto.

The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






