


Hannah-Pamplico Elementary/Middle School is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by providing an environment that supports our purpose – Awesome Happens Here: Inspiring Learning, Leading, and Caring. Both administrators and teachers participate in on-site and off-site professional development. Our new reading coach works with the staff to strengthen literacy techniques across the curriculum. Teachers have embraced the Leader In Me program and have become the professional development leaders at the school, leading book study groups and workshops to strengthen our staff's understanding of the Seven Habits of Highly Effective People. Teachers attend off-site offerings such as the Middle Level Association Conference, the Kindergarten Conference, The International Reading Conference, many best practice workshops, and both the state and national conferences for Gifted and Talented students. A representative sample of teachers and administrators attended Leader In Me professional development opportunities such as the Symposium and individual school Leadership Days. Many extracurricular opportunities support and enhance the core instructional program at HPEMS. The 2014-15 school year included the HPEMS Players presenting a production of The Wizard of Oz Jr. and the return of middle school athletics with football, basketball, and cheerleading. Writing and Social Studies programs were supported by participation in National History Day activities in Primary, Junior, and Junior Select divisions. Hannah-Pamplico Elementary/Middle School is very fortunate to have strong relationships between the adults and students. While the population of our school has become more diverse as new families have moved into the Florence School District Two area, there is still a strong multi-generational presence in our school with many of our current students' parents, grandparents, and other family members having attended school here. This familiarity with our school as part of the community as a whole allows us to continually build relationships and gain greater insight into the students' needs regarding learning, thinking, and life skills. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






