

The mission at JPTIS is a game plan for a winning season through academics, attendance, and attitude. One important element driving our students into the 21st century is focusing on our character education program. Teachers and other staff members send positive postcards home to students that have demonstrated outstanding character and/or performance throughout the week. Clubs represent the positive characters by participating in "professional dress" on Wednesdays. The Junior Beta Club recognized students for their continuous academic success. Students are learning the importance of giving back with projects, such as March of Dimes, Box Tops for Education, Canned Goods Drive, and other community service functions. Career Day was implemented the first time this year by inviting over 16 professionals from the community allowing them to provide 6th graders with vital information, flyers, brochures, and demonstrations of their profession. Most importantly, the focus at JPTIS is on academics. In partnership with families, students and the community, JPTIS highlighted success in the classroom by recognizing students for their academic achievements. JPTIS held regular awards ceremonies and recognized students who excelled in different areas. The gifted and talented students were recognized for their performance on Achieve 3000. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



