

“Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by TRANSFORMing the culture and feeling at our school positively with various programs and ideas during the 2014-2015 school year. Our students were given more freedoms than they had ever experienced in middle school: to move around, socialize and make decisions for themselves. I firmly believe that every choice made by a person results in a consequence. The transition of growing up takes place more in middle school than in any other grade or school. It is our responsibility as educators to give guidance and pass instruction on to students as to help them make quality decisions based on what they know and are aware of. Our leadership team and PBIS team worked on making our rewards system much better. In the past, the system didn’t work very well, and our students did not adhere to the program. However, we reaped many benefits this year because of the way our system worked. Students behaved well and were able to choose rewards on their own. Our Federal Accountability Rating dropped; however, with improvements in discipline and striving to do our best in classrooms, we feel this year has gone very well. MAP testing has been used to improve test scores. Algebra I was again offered to all 8th graders while reading and writing was stressed in all courses and grade levels. We provided “early enrichment” time for students to stay ahead in their academic endeavors and to catch up in other classes. We provided a “help” class to aide students in ELA and Math with measurable increases in each class. Our attendance rate for students and teachers improved this year over last. Many of our teachers attended conferences to help them gain a new insight to our new state standards and what is being focused on around the state and nation. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






