Crayton, located in the heart of the Forest Acres community, serves 6th through 8th grade students. Our community members and parents give an extensive amount of support to our school. This support, coupled with dedicated teachers, allows Crayton to be rated as an Excellent School. We are a Making Middle Grades Work (MMGW) and a Positive Behavior Intervention and Support (PBIS) school. These programs support and guide our decisions on how to improve and enhance our overall learning environment. We strive to encourage a strong sense of camaraderie amongst our students, parents, faculty and the community. Many honors were achieved during the 2014 – 2015 school year including The Palmetto Gold Award, the state's highest award for student achievement and The Palmetto Gold Award for academic improvement. Crayton earned a National Bronze award for our focus on a healthy lifestyle. Multiple students were named Middle School Scholars, South Carolina Junior Scholars, and inducted into the National Junior Honor Society. 100% of our students passed the End of Course math exams and our Math Counts team placed regionally in the top 10. Crayton has celebrated many successes in athletics as well as the visual and performing arts. The Crayton Lady Cavaliers Volleyball team earned the district championship title while other teams participated in the championships. Students earned awards at the South Carolina State Fair and at the Richland County School District One Art Exhibit. 


The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






