

THE INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE (IB) EXAMINATIONS 2020

International Baccalaureate Results

Founded in 1968, the International Baccalaureate® (IB) is a non-profit educational foundation offering four highly respected programs of international education for students aged 3 to 19. Schools authorized to teach IB programs can offer the programs individually or as a continuum.

The IB Diploma Programme (DP) is an academically challenging and balanced program of education with final examinations that prepare students, aged 16 to 19, for success at university and life beyond. Visit www.ibo.org for more information.

The DP curriculum is made up of six subject groups and the DP core, comprising theory of knowledge (TOK), creativity, activity, service (CAS) and the extended essay. Through the Diploma Programme (DP) core, students reflect on the nature of knowledge, complete independent research and undertake a project that often involves community service. The six subject groups are listed below.

Subject Group	Description
Studies in Language and Literature	Courses offer a broad range of texts, and students grow to appreciate a language's complexity, wealth and subtleties in a variety of contexts.
Language Acquisition	The main emphasis of the modern language courses is on the acquisition and use of language in a range of contexts and for different purposes while, at the same time, promoting an understanding of another culture through the study of its language.
Individuals and Societies	Business management, economics, geography, global politics, history, information technology in a global society, philosophy, psychology, social and cultural anthropology, world religions
Sciences	Biology; computer science; chemistry; design technology; physics; sports, exercise and health science
Mathematics	Mathematical studies standard level, mathematics standard level, mathematics higher level, further mathematics higher level
The Arts	Dance, music, film, theater, visual arts

For the diploma programme, students choose courses from the following subject groups: studies in language and literature; language acquisition; individuals and societies; sciences; mathematics; and the arts. Students may opt to study an additional science, individuals and societies, or languages course, instead of a course in the arts.

Students will take some subjects at higher level (HL) and some at standard level (SL). HL and SL courses differ in scope but are measured according to the same grade descriptors, with students expected to demonstrate a greater body of knowledge, understanding and skills at higher level. Each student takes at least three (but not more than four) subjects at higher level, and the remaining at standard level. Standard level subjects take up 150 teaching hours. Higher level comprises 240 teaching hours.

The following table displays a summary of the students' examinations for the 2019-20 school year, grouped by school. The data is for South Carolina public school students taking IB subject area tests, TOK and/or EE. The grades awarded for each subject course range from 1 (lowest) to 7 (highest). The grades awarded for TOK and EE range from E (lowest) to A (highest). Subject grades of 4, 5, 6, and 7 are considered satisfactory or better. TOK and EE grades of A, B, and C are considered satisfactory or better. Results for groups smaller than five are not displayed and are masked with --.

Students studying for the diploma need to complete six courses. They can earn up to 7 points for each subject and up to three additional points for their combined results on Theory of Knowledge (TOK) and Extended Essay (EE). The diploma is awarded to students who gain at least 24 points, subject to certain minimum levels of performance across the whole program, and satisfactory participation in the creativity, action, service requirement. The highest total that a Diploma Programme student can be awarded is 45 points.

The following table displays diploma results by school. “Number of IB Diplomas Attempted” is the number of students in the second year of the two-year IB program who registered as diploma candidates during testing.

NOTE: The tables above reflect South Carolina IB results provided by IBO as of September 2020. Score results that were then pending but were resolved after September 2020 are not reflected in this report. Note that there are students taking IB courses who are not participating in the Diploma Programme.

NOTE: Due to school closures as a result of the pandemic experienced worldwide, the written components of the IB assessments were not administered in the 2019-20 school year. Under ordinary conditions, the IB scores are based on multiple methods of assessment. For the 2019-20 school year, the IB program developed a reliable and valid score based upon the required assessed work done during the two years of the courses. Some of this work is usually marked by external examiners and others are usually marked by the teachers, whose marking is then moderated by the IB program through sampling. This year external examiners marked all the internal work and combined with teachers' predicted grades, and for each course, a school context factor based on historical prediction data, the IBO was able to determine a final grade.
