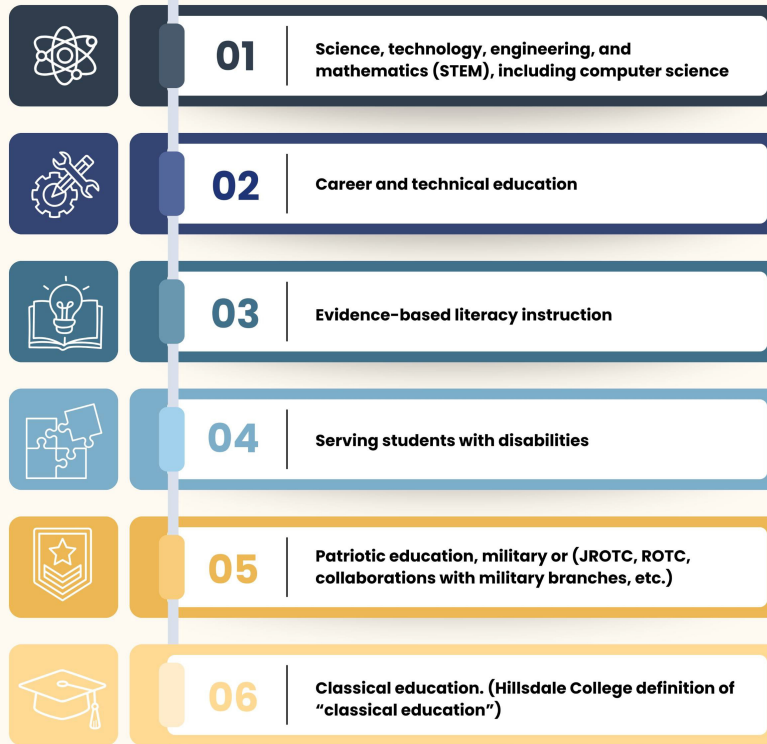

What Is Happening with ACT 123 (Formerly Bill 454)? More Importantly, What Does It Mean for You?





ACT 123: What Does It Mean for You?

The Charter School Accountability Act (A.123) introduces a comprehensive set of updates designed to strengthen transparency, governance, and oversight across South Carolina's charter school sector. **While the law preserves the core flexibility and autonomy that define charter schools, it establishes clearer expectations for financial reporting, board governance, and authorizer oversight.** Notably, the legislation formalizes terminology by replacing "sponsor" with "authorizer" and requires schools to publicly post annual audits and disclose management contracts, ensuring greater visibility into financial operations.

The Act also places a stronger emphasis on governance and accountability. Charter school boards will be expected to meet enhanced ethics and conflict-of-interest standards, and authorizers will take on a more structured and active oversight role, supported by the SCDE. Schools should anticipate more consistent performance evaluations, clearer renewal and intervention processes, and defined requirements for replicating schools.

Over the past month, the SCDE has met with the Statewide Authorizers, the Local District Authorizers, and the Public Charter School Alliance to share the methodical timeline for implementation and listen to feedback on any questions, concerns, and needs for specific clarifications. The goal is to maintain the healthy relationship the SCDE has developed with the authorizers and charter schools, and ensure effective communication on processes and expectations throughout. In the near future, the SCDE will meet with select charter schools to receive direct feedback. In the meantime, continue to ask any questions you might have to your authorizer to see if they have already received feedback to your particular question.

Overall, ACT.123 represents a shift toward a more mature accountability framework for charter schools—one that maintains innovation and choice while introducing stronger guardrails. Schools are encouraged to begin reviewing their financial practices, governance policies, and compliance systems now to prepare for implementation, and to stay engaged with their authorizer as additional guidance becomes available.

Is There a Financial Impact to the Act?

The Authorizers believe there may be some operational impact on charter schools, but could not financially quantify at this time. The SCDE is exploring additional supports to aid with this as well as authorizer oversight.

School Spotlight: P.A.L.M.



Palmetto Academy for Learning Motorsports Charter School (PALM) is one of the most unique educational institutions in our state. Its competency-based courses prepare students for a variety of careers within the motorsports industry, including Automotive Technology, Digital Arts & Graphics, Welding, and Collision Technology. Students can even earn industry certifications through their local technical college in these highly competitive fields. As seen in the picture on the left, PALM has the first and only **stock car race team** in the country.

However, three years ago, the school faced a major obstacle. Statewide test scores indicated that many students were performing below grade level in Language Arts and Mathematics, resulting in an Unsatisfactory designation on the state report card.

With a change in leadership came a strong determination to improve academic outcomes. Principal Cedric Brown and Assistant Principal Heidi Roberts implemented several key changes that yielded significant results. First, the South Carolina Department of Education connected PALM with Transformation Coach Amy Dellinger. Together, they deconstructed curriculum standards and worked backward to create manageable goals with clear action steps. Once a plan was in place, the focus shifted to implementation. Second, they secured staff buy-in. As Dellinger built trust and provided professional development support to Roberts, Roberts then extended that same support and guidance to the academic teaching staff. The school shifted to a 90-minute block schedule, giving teachers uninterrupted time to implement instructional strategies effectively. Finally, PALM established one-on-one tutoring sessions on Fridays to help struggling students catch up, while students who were on track were granted a remote workday. The school also developed an incentive structure that leveraged students' interest in additional motorsports electives, provided they remained current with their academic assignments.

These structural changes proved highly successful. In the years since receiving an Unsatisfactory rating, PALM has climbed all the way to an Excellent rating on this past year's State Report Card! Great work team!

Workforce Center of Excellence Award

April 21, 2026 The South Carolina Public Charter School district (PCSD) bestowed the designation of **Workforce Center of Excellence** upon Pee Dee Math, Science, & Technology Academy (PDMSTA) in order to recognize its success preparing students through real-world industry certifications, dual enrollment courses opportunities, and authentic internship experiences.
