- ▶ Develop a career path


THE FINANCIAL AID PROCESS

Finding financial aid can seem overwhelming when you're trying to get ready for college or career school. The U.S. Department of Education's office of Federal Student Aid is here to help you get the money you need to pay for your education.

PREPARATION

Scholarships and state aid can help cover the cost of college or career school, but you may find yourself in need of federal assistance.

Many states have college funding programs. Ask a guidance counselor or your college financial aid office for more information.



Look for scholarships through your state or college as well as national and community organizations.

It's time to apply for financial aid.

FAFSA

The FAFSA is the *Free Application for Federal Student Aid* and is the only way to apply for federal student aid. The schools you list on your application will use FAFSA information to evaluate your financial need and determine how much federal aid you are eligible to receive. Many states and colleges also use information from your FAFSA to provide their own financial aid.

Complete the FAFSA online at www.fafsa.gov. Make sure to fill out and submit the FAFSA each year you are in college.



Each January, the FAFSA is available for the upcoming school year. It is best to fill it out as early as you can because some aid is first come, first served.

When you complete the FAFSA, you'll need to provide personal and tax information. If you've filed your taxes already, you may be able to automatically retrieve the information from the IRS. If you haven't, just estimate your tax information and update it later.

After you submit your FAFSA, you'll receive your *Student Aid Report (SAR)*. Your SAR summarizes the information in your FAFSA. Review it and make corrections if needed.



Your FAFSA helps your school determine the types of federal student aid you are eligible to receive.

TYPES OF FEDERAL STUDENT AID

As the largest provider of financial aid, the U.S. Department of Education's office of Federal Student Aid provides grants, loans, and work-study funds.



Grants are free money that do not have to be repaid.

Student loans are real loans (like a car or home loan) that need to be repaid with interest.

A work-study job gives you the opportunity to earn money to help pay your educational expenses.

AWARD

Your award letter explains the combination of federal grants, loans, and work-study a college is offering you. The offer might also contain state and institutional aid. If you receive award letters from multiple colleges or career schools, you should compare them and decide which school works best for you.



COLLEGE

Every year, millions of new students attend college or career school for the first time. Your college or career school has a financial aid office to help guide you along the way.



BEYOND EDUCATION

WORKFORCE

When you take the time to plan for your education and let Federal Student Aid help you along the way, you'll be setting the foundation for a bright future and success in the workforce.

REPAYMENT

Once you leave school, you will need to repay your student loans. Contact your loan servicer to discuss your repayment options.



CTE State Overview

At the secondary level, CTE is delivered through comprehensive high schools; career and technology centers that provide supplemental CTE programs to students within most of the larger school districts; two state correctional agencies, one for juveniles and one for adults, operating as special school districts and providing secondary CTE programs; and independent, multi-district career centers that provide CTE programs to students from districts that do not have their own career centers.

At the postsecondary level, CTE is delivered through the state's technical colleges.

Enrollment Data (OCTAE 2011-2012)

Secondary: 175,326
Postsecondary: 55,343

Student Performance (OCTAE 2011-2012)

96 percent of CTE high school students graduated

92 percent of CTE postsecondary students met performance goals for technical skills

80 percent remained enrolled or transferred to another postsecondary institution

Perkins Funding (OCTAE)

South Carolina received \$16,827,895 for Fiscal Year 2013, about \$1.8 million less than in 2012 and \$3.7 million less than in 2010. South Carolina allocates 70 percent of Perkins funds for secondary programs and 30 percent for postsecondary programs.

CTE Program Excellence

Greenville Technical College (GTC) was established to help improve the state's economy by producing skilled workers, and Greenville Tech has worked closely with employers to reach that goal ever since. GTC has participated in the BMW Scholars program since August 2011. This program provides real-world experience by allowing students enrolled in career paths related to manufacturing technology to attend class full-time at local community colleges while working part-time at BMW, rotating through different areas of the production process. During this process, BMW offers tuition assistance toward obtaining a two-year associate degree. While there are no job guarantees, when students finish, they are considered for full-time openings. The BMW Scholars program allows the company to create a well-qualified workforce. GTC partners with many other companies in a similar manner, including Michelin North America, GE, Bosch Rexroth and ADEX Machining. In addition, the college offers a wide range of programs in engineering, industrial and transportation technology, along with courses in Arts and Sciences, Business and Public Service, and Health Sciences and Nursing divisions along with a Corporate and Career division, which helps more than 400 companies annually with workforce needs. *(Profile adapted from the CTE Monthly newsletter)*

A youth apprenticeship partnership between Tognum America, one of the world's leading suppliers of engines, propulsion systems and diesel, gas and fuel cell power systems, and Aiken County Career and Technology Center, Aiken Technical College and the Aiken County School District combines high school education, classroom technical training and hands-on learning at the MTU Aiken Plant. As part of the apprenticeship program, students take courses at the Career Center with equipment provided by Tognum and curriculum developed in partnership with the firm. Career Center Director Brooks Smith explains that this training will lead to high-tech, high-paying jobs for Aiken County students: "When they complete this program, they'll be offered a starting job at \$32,000 a year. A lot of people with four-year degrees would love that." This U.S. Department of Labor Registered Apprenticeship program kicked off in the 2012-2013 school year. Participating students say they are learning and enjoying the experience and are interested in pursuing skilled jobs as well as postsecondary education. *(Profile adapted from Apprenticeship Carolina)*

2014 National Career Development Association

SC State Winners Announced

Recently 27 South Carolina public school students and 8 adult educators and/or adult learners were chosen as state winners in the National Career Development Association’s 49th annual poetry and poster contest. The poetry and poster competition is conducted annually by the National Career Development Association in conjunction with the SC Department of Education, Office of Career and Technology Education as a means of promoting career awareness at all grade levels in schools. This year’s competition attracted more than 6,000 entries state-wide, which demonstrates the extremely high level of career awareness activity in South Carolina.”

For this competition, South Carolina students and educators created poems and posters based on the national theme of “Reimagining Life’s Possibilities: Celebrating First Jobs through Encore Careers “. The poems and posters were first judged at the regional level. In turn, all first, second and third place regional winners were submitted to the State for state-level adjudication. All State winning entries were submitted to the National Career Development Association for judging at the national level. The National Career Development Association will release the names of the national winners for this year in April. The contest was judged on grade-level divisions in three categories: poetry, traditional poster (Category 1) and posters utilizing multi-media applications (Category 2).
