## **I. Executive Summary**

The purpose of this report is to provide a comprehensive evaluation to determine the overall effectiveness of the South Carolina 21st CCLC subgrantees' implementation of their 21st CCLC programs and their progress towards achieving specific performance objectives, indicators and measures.

The 21<sup>st</sup> Century Community Learning Centers (21<sup>st</sup> CCLC) Program is authorized under Title Four, Part B of The Elementary and Secondary Education Act as amended by the No Child Left Behind Act 2001. State educational agencies such as the South Carolina Department of Education apply to the US Department of Education for 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC grants. In turn, local education agencies, universities, faith based organizations, and nonprofit organizations may apply to states for subgrants. Eligible organizations or consortium of two or more such agencies organizations or entities can apply. The South Carolina Department of Education awarded 79 new or continuing subgrants for programs during the 2012-13 school year to 64 entities including 37 school districts, 1 university, 2 faith-based organizations and 24 community/non-profit organizations. Collectively, subgrantees operated 171 centers or sites. However, Blueprint Academy supplied only "Partner Contribution" information; therefore it was not possible to include it in the report's analytics. See Appendix 1: South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC Subgrantees and Project Sites, for a full list included in this report.

### **Summary of Key Findings and Outcomes**

#### ***Characteristics of South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students***

1. South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs served 14,456 students and 376 adults during the 2012 – 2013 school year.
2. South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC's served a diverse student population, 72% black, 6% Hispanic, 19% white and the remaining 3% included all other groups.
3. South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC student population was 49% males and 51% females.
4. Statewide, 14 % of all students have an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) compared to 15.4 % of the 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students.
5. Statewide 52% participated in the free and reduced lunch program compared to 90 % of the 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students.

6. South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC sites served 53% elementary school students, 6% a combination of elementary and middle school students, 29% middle school students, 5% a combination of middle and high school students, 5% high school students, and 5% all grades.

### ***21CCLC Activities***

1. The majority of South Carolina's 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC activities related to academics focused on increasing academic success including enrichment, remediation, tutoring, supplemental education services, and homework help.
2. Activities summarized by the APR category show student activities vastly outnumbered parent activities. Data indicated only 612 adults were enrolled in all the program's activities with one site accounting for almost 50% (293) of the total, and six sites accounting for the remaining 49%. According to the data in AS21, (a commercially available on-line database used by all sub-grantees) only 376 parents participated in any activities.

***Federal Teacher Survey Results:*** Based on the 4,900 teacher surveys completed and returned, overall teachers believe that many regular program attendees have made improvements during the school year. Specifically teachers believed that:

- 79 percent of students improved their overall academic performance
- 76 percent of students participate more in class
- 71 percent of students completed their homework more on time
- 74 percent completed homework to teachers' satisfaction
- 74 percent of students come to school more motivated to learn
- 75 percent of students are more attentive
- 65 percent of students get along better with other students
- 66 percent of students behave better in class
- 66 percent the students attend class more regularly
- 77 percent of students volunteer more for work and responsibility

***South Carolina 21st CCLC's Five Focus Areas:*** When completing their applications, subgrantees generated their own objectives and indicators based on the five focus areas listed below. Data was collected and analyzed for each focus area. Sites reported their progress on meeting their stated objectives. In order to summarize the outcomes for this report, each objective was then categorized as relating to one of the five focus areas.

1. Academic Achievement
2. Attendance (in the regular school day)
3. Behavior (in the regular school day)
4. Family Literacy
5. Sustainability

***1. Academic Achievement:*** Results show that:

- A. 30 percent of the students improve their grades in math from the first marking period to the last.
- B. 27 percent of the students moved from *not met* to met or *exemplary* on the South Carolina Math PASS assessment.
- C. 29 percent of the students moved from *not met* to met or *exemplary* on the South Carolina English/ Language Arts PASS assessment.
- D. 30 percent of the students improved their grades in reading from the first marking period to the last.
- E. Results of outcomes reported by all sites show most sites have met their academic achievement objectives or made progress in meeting the objectives.
- F. Students who attended the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs 60 days more were more likely to pass their standardized math and reading tests than those who attended less than 60 days. The probability of this occurring by chance was calculated to be less than 1%. This is a significant finding since it demonstrates the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs can have a profound effect on student outcomes on achievement tests provided the participants regularly. A further comparison of the programs that participated in the CIPAS process revealed that programs scoring in the top half of the distribution (2.7 to 4) had 7% more students attend more than sixty days as compared to the bottom half (1 to 2.6), 68.3% to 61.3%, respectively.

## ***2. Attendance (in the regular school day)***

- A. Results based on the teacher survey show that 75 percent of students improved their day school attendance, ranging from slight to moderate to significant improvement since attending the 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC program.
- B. Results of outcomes reported by all sites show most sites have met their attendance objectives or have made progress in meeting the objectives.

## ***3. Improved classroom behavior.***

- A. Results based on the teacher survey show that 66 percent of students improved their classroom behavior, ranging from slight to moderate to significant improvement since attending the 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC program.
- B. Results based on the teacher survey show that 74 percent of the students improved completing their homework to the teacher satisfaction, ranging from slight to moderate to significant improvement since attending the 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC program.
- C. Results based on the teacher survey show that 76 percent the students improved their classroom participation, ranging from slight to moderate to significant improvement since attending the 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC program.
- D. Results of outcomes reported by all sites, most sites have met their attendance objectives or made progress in meeting the objectives.

## ***3. Family Literacy***

- A. Results of outcomes reported by all sites, most sites have met Family Literacy objectives, or made progress in meeting the objectives.
- B. However, only 609 adults were enrolled into AS21 and less than 400 appear as actively participating

## ***5. Sustainability***

One of the expectations placed on subgrantees is to be able to sustain their program after their 21CCLC federal funds are no longer available.

- A. Most subgrantees reported reaching their objectives for sustainability.

B. Cumulatively, the subgrantees reported \$6.5 million in contributions from partner organizations and other sources.

## II. Introduction

The 21st Century Community Learning Centers (21<sup>st</sup> CCLC) program subgrants are authorized under Title IV, Part B, as amended, of the *Elementary and Secondary Education Act* (ESEA). Federal funds are allocated on a formula basis to the South Carolina Department of Education (SCDE) to manage and monitor the competitive subgrant programs.

The federal authorizing statute and non-regulatory guidance define the purpose of the subgrant program: (1) provide opportunities for academic enrichment, including providing tutorial services to help students in high-poverty areas and those who attend low-performing schools meet state and local student performance standards in core academic subjects such as reading, math, and science; (2) offer students a broad array of additional services, programs, and activities, such as youth development activities; drug and violence prevention programs; counseling programs; art, music, and recreation programs; technology education programs; and character education programs, that are designed to reinforce and complement the regular academic program of participating students; and (3) offer families of students served by community learning centers opportunities for literacy and related educational development.

A 21st Century Community Learning Center offers academic, artistic, and cultural enrichment opportunities to students and their families during non-school hours (before or after school) or periods when school is not in session (including holidays, weekends, or summer recess). According to section 4201(b)(1) of the program statute, a community learning center assists students in meeting state and local academic achievement standards in core academic subjects, such as reading and mathematics, by providing the students with opportunities for academic enrichment. Centers also provide students with a broad array of other activities (such as drug and violence prevention, counseling, art, music, recreation, technology, and character education programs) during periods when school is not in session. A 21st CCLC must also serve the families of participating students (e.g., through family literacy programs).

A 21st CCLC can be located in an elementary or secondary school or other similarly accessible facility. Centers provide a range of high-quality services to support student learning and development, including tutoring and mentoring, homework help, academic enrichment (such as

hands-on science or technology programs), and community service opportunities, as well as music, arts, sports, and cultural activities.

Hours of Operation: Programs must operate at least four days per week for a minimum of 12 hours a week for no less than 15 weeks, excluding summer, during year one. In years two through four, applicants must operate at least four days per week for a minimum of 12 hours a week for no less than 30 weeks during the academic year, excluding summer.

Target Population: Programs must serve students who attend schools that receive, or are eligible to receive, Title I school-wide assistance and at least 40 percent of the student population is eligible to receive free or reduced-price lunch.

Programmatic Operation: The 21st CCLC services are to be provided outside the regular school day or during periods when school is not in session (e.g., before school, after school, evenings, weekends, holidays, or summer). The program may offer services to students during normal school hours on days when school is not in session (e.g., school holidays or teacher professional development days).

When completing their applications, subgrantees generated their own objectives and indicators based on these five focus areas identified by the SCDE:

1. Academic Achievement
2. Attendance (in the regular school day)
3. Behavior (in the regular school day)
4. Family Literacy
5. Sustainability

They were also free to add additional objectives that would meet additional needs of their specific community. Nutrition and Fitness, and General Enrichment objectives were added by many subgrantees.

### **III. 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC Evaluation Plan**

In preparation for the 2012-13 school year, the South Carolina Department of Education's (SCDE) 21st Century Community Learning Center Office selected a new External Evaluation vendor. The new vendor, 21<sup>st</sup> Century Grant Services, selected a data collection system, Cayen's After School 21 (AS21) for grantees, and implemented a continuous improvement process- Continuous Improvement Process for After School (CIPAS). The evaluation plan was created during the 2012-13 school year by the evaluation team that included 21<sup>st</sup> Century Grant Services, Inc., Cayen Systems Inc. and South Carolina Department of Education staff members.

**Training:** Training on the new data collection and evaluation plan followed the timeline below:

**January 2013:** 21st Century Grant Services was awarded the data evaluation contract in December 2012. Training on the new data collection system, Cayen Systems AS21, began immediately in January of 2013. (SCDE had instructed grantees to keep track of their attendance and other PPICs data in a spreadsheet or similar format until the new system could be implemented).

Cayen Systems and 21st Century Grant Services provided four regional trainings across the state for all 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC sub-grantees. Trainings were led by Cayen System's lead trainer and an associate trainer and attended by 21st Century Grant Services and SCDE staff. Each full-day training was held in a central, regional location that provided computer access to all attending so they could practice on the web-based data collection system, AS21, and ask questions. In addition to the group trainings, additional customer support via telephone, e-messaging (e-mail, text, chat) was and continues to be available to all grantees.

**April 2013:** With three months of experience entering data into AS21, SC 21st CCLC grantees were next introduced to CIPAS (Continuous Improvement Process for After School). A training was held for all grantees in Columbia, SC in conjunction with a required SCDE program directors meeting. At this event, an effort was also made by 21st Century Grant Services to update grantee contact information. The four hour training included information on using the virtual CIPAS tool, theory and best practice of continuous improvement, and the history of CIPAS as a continuous improvement system designed specifically for 21st Century Community

Learning Center programs over ten years ago. Also covered were timelines for completion and customer support information. 21st Century Grant Services and Cayen Systems staff were available for support and troubleshooting. Over 100 hours were spent by 21st Century Grant Services staff in the field alone, visiting grantees who needed one-on-one assistance and providing assistance by telephone.

**September 2013:** During the implementation of AS21 as the new data collection system for SCDE 21st CCLC grantees, as expected, there were several issues that rose to the surface as needing immediate attention. Two of the biggest factors were timeliness of data entry and completeness of all required data fields. Also, several capacity building needs for programs were identified through an analysis of statewide CIPAS data. In the day long September 2013 training hosted by 21st Century Grant Services, Cayen Systems staff spent the majority of the day addressing two main issues; *Why data collection is important and How to use AS21 as a tool to collect that data.* Additional time was spent on a review of how to use the AS21 tool (wireless was available to all participants and the trainer used a live site for demonstration purposes) and answering grantee questions. At the close of the session, CIPAS results were shared with grantees and trends were identified and discussed.

Subgrantees began using AS21 online by registering perspective student and adult participant. Once registered, student data was imported from district or state student information systems, or input manually. Student information, including an accurate student ID, address information, demographic, and other data was gathered. Grades and test scores were either imported from other databases or entered manually.

Attendance by participant, activity, date of participation, and actual in/out times were recorded on an ongoing basis. Staff members and service providers were assigned to lead various activity sessions by name on the attendance roster and related activity documents. Activities and sessions were recorded by the centers at the organization/grantee level.

AS21 generated multiple summary and detail reports that were used in the analysis of the overall program, subgrantee programs and specific sites. Each section of the federal 21st Century

Community Learning Center Annual Performance Report (APR) was included and electronically transferred from the AS21 system into the PPICS system. Funding sources and community partners contributions were also recorded for each subgrantee.

For students who attended 30 days or more, one of their day school subject teachers were asked to complete the Federal Teacher Survey. These surveys were uploaded into the AS21 and also uploaded into PPICS.

Student data, subgrantee and site specific data was downloaded and imported to Excel for further analysis. For example, student grades from the first to the last marking periods and PASS assessment scores from the 2012 and 2013 school years were imported to determine changes over time, and to correlate these academic variables with other measures.

**Data Sources:** Five data sources were used to inform analytical efforts relative to program objective outcomes, and program effectiveness. These included:

1. ***Cayen AS21:*** South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC sites entered data into the AS21 on student demographics, student and parent attendance, activities offered, staff, student PASS scores and grades in Mathematics and Language Arts, and the federal teacher survey.
2. ***The Profile and Performance Information Collection System (PPICS):*** The United States Department of Education uses PPICS to compile and summarize data about the states' 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC grants. These data are derived from the Cayen AS21 system and then uploaded into PPICS.
3. ***South Carolina Palmetto Assessment of State Standards (SCPASS)***  
**Grades 3-8:** Statewide PASS results were obtained from the following website:

4. ***National Center for Educational Statistics:*** Number of Limited English Proficient students, number of students with IEP's, and the Free and Reduced Lunch data were obtained from the website: <https://nces.ed.gov/>
5. ***South Carolina 2013 Continuous Improvement Process for After School (CIPAS):*** Fifty-three subgrantees participated in CIPAS. CIPAS was used to document what program services are working well while identifying areas of improvement. In an effort

to show the relationships between both qualitative and quantitative data sources, some of the CIPAS findings are included in a separate report.

**Limitations of the Study:** Accurately measuring the outcomes, impact, effectiveness and efficacy of most education programs and treatments is limited by bias and random error. Educational evaluations are typically based on observational data and not from randomized controlled trials. South Carolina students were not randomly selected to be part of the programs, but were either recommended by classroom teachers or self-selected, leading to participant bias. Program leaders had various levels of training and expertise and treatment type and dosage differs by site because each individual program had different goals and objectives. Self report bias is another factor because the study relies heavily on data reported by the programs' personnel themselves. The biggest statistical limitation to the study is that complete data sets were not available leading to multiple internal and external validity concerns. In the absence of control groups such as matched pairs of students, i.e., from the same schools having the same day school teachers being divided into two groups, one attending the after school program and the other only attending during the day, it is not possible to separate the effects of the day school program and the after school treatment. As a result it is difficult to determine the effect size each program has had on student performance and behavior.

Variation in how the data were reported resulted in discrepancies occurring when looking across the data set since many sites did not record all of the required data. This is reflected in the "Compliance" section of this report. Assessment of any of the individual programs was limited by the data provided. This is expected to improve as program staff members gain additional experience to more efficiently engage the AS21 system. Results of this report as an indicator of successful implementation of the 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs can most effectively be used for comparison overtime as the individual programs mature.

#### IV. South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC Student Characteristics

Student data was collected by 170 afterschool program sites and recorded in AS21. Demographic information included gender, racial group, grade level, Individual Education Plans (IEP), LEP status, Free and Reduced Lunch Program qualification, attendance, grade level, fall and spring Mathematics and Language Arts grades for comparison and PASS scores from 2012 and 2013 for comparison. Appendix 1: Student Demographics by Site includes data summarized by site.

The number of students who attended 1-29 days, 30-59 days, 60-89 days, 90 days or more, and number of regular attendees (students who attended at least 30 days during the school year) are depicted in Figure 1 below:

These are outstanding results that indicate the programs, in general, were able to retain 85.28% of the students for at least 30 days, placing 12,009 students as Regular Attendees as defined by the US Department of Education.

During the summer of 2012, there were 29 programs in operation and collectively they served 1,549 students.

Students from all grades, Pre-K through 12 participated in the programs. The largest number of students attending were in grades 2 through 8. High school student participants in grades 9 through 12 totaled 850. (See Figure 2.)

### **Characteristics of Students**

**Gender:** The South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs served 51% females and 49% males. This minor difference in the number of female and male students served indicates the programs appealed to both boys and girls almost equally.

**Racial Groups:** Of those students, whose race was reported (7,467), 72% were black and 6% were Hispanic 19% white students and the remaining percentage of the population 3% included all other groups. These results indicate that the programs served a diverse population of students. (See Figure 3A)

**Grade Level of Students:** Most of the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students attend elementary schools. Individual sites serving only elementary students comprised 54% of the total, 6% served both elementary and middle school students, 5% both middle and high school students, 5% high school students, and 2% served elementary, middle and high school students.

Figure 3B shows the number of South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students by grade level at the time of their attendance.

**Students with an Individual Educational Plan:** In South Carolina, 14% of all students attending public schools have IEP's. Based on 3,960 student records in AS21 that indicated whether or not a participating student had an Individual Education Plan, the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup>

CCLC programs included at least 610 students (15.4%) with Individual Educational Plans (IEP). However, since only 3,960 entries were made in AS21 for this parameter, the actual number of students with IEP's was likely under reported. Figure 4 compares the population of students with IEP's to those without IEP's who participated in the 2012-13 school year.

**Limited English Proficiency:** Limited English Proficient (LEP) students comprise 5% of the student population of South Carolina. The South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs recorded serving 238 LEP students; however since only 4,073 entries were made in AS21 for this measure, the actual number of LEP students was likely greatly under reported.

**Students Qualifying in Free and Reduced Lunch Programs:** The National School Lunch Program is a federally assisted meal program operating in public and nonprofit private schools and residential child care institutions. It provides nutritionally balanced, low-cost or free lunches to children each school day. Eligibility is based on family income and size and is formulated taking into account the official Poverty Level set forth by the federal government. It is a good measure of where the students' families stand in the income distribution.

In South Carolina statewide, 52% of the students qualified for free and reduced lunch compared to 90 % of the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students whose free and reduced lunch status was entered into AS21 ( 5,476 qualified versus 602 who did not qualify). Note well: no free or reduced lunch status was entered for 8,378 students. However, based on the available data, it is apparent that the subgrantees are primarily serving student and families with low incomes and students attending Title 1 schools. (See Figure 5)

## V. 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC Services and Participation

Subgrantees were allowed to use 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC funds to provide any of the following activities:

- Remedial education and academic enrichment learning programs, including additional assistance to students to allow them to improve their academic achievement
- Mathematics and Science education
- Career exploration and readiness
- Arts and Music education
- Entrepreneurial education
- Tutoring and mentoring (including services provided by senior citizen volunteers)
- Language skills and academic achievement for limited English proficient students
- Nutrition, wellness, health, and recreation
- Telecommunications and technology education
- Expanded library service hours
- Parental involvement and family literacy for adults who are family members of participating students
- Assistance to enable students who have been truant, suspended, or expelled to improve their academic achievement
- Drug and violence prevention, counseling, and character education
- Readiness services to prepare prekindergarten students for success in school

**Activities Grouped by Subject:** Figure 6 reflects for each activity grouped by subject, the number of activities, the number of participants, the number of service hours as reported within the AS21 system. Participants were counted for each activity, so the number of participants in any category is a duplicate count. For example, if a student participated in football and baseball, he or she would be counted twice under the Health and Fitness category. The sum of all hours participants attended any activity reflects the Service Hours for each category. Hours could be duplicated if more than one subject was covered during the period. A full representation of activities by subgrantee can be found in Appendix 3.

The hours spent in activities related to Reading/Literacy, Mathematics and Science account for 44.4% of the total hours. This was expected since the first focus area objective was to improve student academic achievement. However, there was a good mix of other activities including many that were most likely of high interest to the student offered which may have had an impact on the retention of students in the program. Many of the activities including Arts/Music, Culture/Social Studies, Entrepreneurship, Telecommunications and Technology may not be included in the day school activities in many of the schools the students attend.

To more accurately represent the total number of service hours (4,696,980) activities were placed in each of the following categories: Academic Support, Core Academics, Learning Enrichment or Recreation. (See Figure 6)

**US Department of Education Annual Performance Report (APR):** For reporting data into the US Department of Education Annual Performance Report (APR), activities are grouped into 19 categories. The number of activities in each category was tabulated for each site. Figure 7. summarizes the activities of all sites in all 19 categories including the number of activities and percent each category represents of the total, the number of duplicated participants, the total service hours and the percent of the total time spent on these activities.

The APR report indicates 47.9 % of the service hours for Youth were spent in Academic Enrichment Learning. This percentage matches well with the total hours spent in activities related to Reading/Literacy, Mathematics and Science (44.4%) mentioned above. Activities to Promote Youth Leadership, Homework Help, and Tutoring accounted for 21.8% of the hours spent. Recreational and other Youth activities accounted for 23.1% of the time spent. Supplemental Education Services accounted for 2.2% of the hours spent. All other youth activities accounted for 8% of the hours spent.

The APR report indicates only 0.58 % of the service hours were spent in Adult activities. Family Literacy activities, one of the Five Focus areas, had only 765 duplicated adult participants. These findings indicate a low level parental involvement and engagement occurred. Contrary to this finding, 89.1% of the programs indicated they met or made progress in reaching their Family Literacy objectives. This is most likely due to the lack of data collected on adult participation.

## VI. South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC Student Academic Performance Outcomes

To measure Student Academic Achievement two independent measures were used. PASS Mathematics and Reading/Language Arts for 2012 and 2013 and Mathematics and Language Arts report card grades from the first and last marking periods were compared.

**PASS Mathematics and Reading/Language Arts scores:** Figure 8 contains the outcome of the 2013 PASS English/Language Arts assessment based on the level of achievement of the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students whose scores were recorded in AS21. Figure 9 contains the outcome of the 2013 PASS Mathematics assessment based on the level of achievement of the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students whose scores were recorded in AS21.

The English/Language Arts PASS results for South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC at all grade levels indicate 63.7% passed. The Mathematic PASS results for South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC at all grade levels indicate 59.1% passed. PASS scores statewide by grade level were compared to those of South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students from the 2013 administration of the assessments. Note well: the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC scores were derived from 9,408 records.

A comparison of 2013 English/Language Arts and Mathematics PASS assessment results by grade level statewide to South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students was made. The results are reflected in Figure 10.

On average, across all grades on both the English/Language Arts and Mathematics PASS, South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students scored lower than the state average.

To gain more insight into how South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students were impacted by their participation in the after school programs, a comparison of how they performed on the 2012 PASS to the 2103 PASS for both English/Language Arts and Mathematics was made based on the failure rate each year. The change in passing rate on the English/Language Arts and Mathematics PASS from 2012 to 1013 is reflects in Figure11.

These findings indicate that a significant number of South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students who failed either or both the English/Language Arts and Mathematics PASS in 2012 were able to increase their scores to passing in 2013, 28.6% and 26.7%, respectively. See Appendix 4 for Grades and test scores by site.

**Determining the Treatment Effect on PASS scores:** A Chi square test was performed to determine whether attending a South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC had an effect on how students performed on the PASS. The analysis was based on the number students who attended a South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC program greater than 60 days compared to less than 60 days. The results are reflected in Figure12.

It was found that students who attended the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs 60 days more were more likely to pass their standardized math and reading tests than those who attended less than 60 days. The probability of this occurring by chance was calculated to be less than 1%. This is a significant finding since it demonstrates the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs can have a profound effect on student outcomes on achievement tests provided the participate regularly. A further comparison of the programs that participated in the CIPAS process revealed that programs scoring in the top half of the distribution (2.7 to 4) had 7% more students attend more than sixty days as compared to the bottom half (1 to 2.6), 68.3% to 61.3%, respectively.

**Student Report Card Grades:** South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students’ day school grades in Language Arts and Mathematics from the First Marking Period to the Last Marking Period were entered in AS21 for comparison over time. Figures 13 and 14 reflect the results of this analysis.

Based on the limited sample size (4,755), it can be concluded for those students whose Language Arts grades were entered into AS21, over 65% of the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students’ grades remained the same or improved from the first marking period to the last marking period.


Based on the limited sample size (5,271), it can be concluded for those students whose Mathematics grades were entered into AS21, over 65% of the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students' grades remained the same or improved from the first marking period to the last marking period.

## VII. 21CCLC Teacher Survey Results

The *Teacher Survey* is a uniform instrument designed by the US Department of Education to be used by all 21CCLC programs to report the beliefs of the day school teachers about the impact the programs are having on regular student participants. Regular student attendees are defined as those who attended at least 30 days during the academic year of the program. For elementary school students, these surveys are to be completed by their classroom teacher. For middle and high school students, their English (Language Arts) or Mathematics teacher should complete the survey. Surveys should be completed toward the end of the academic year since teachers are asked to assess changes in their students' performance since they have attended the 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC program. Survey results are loaded into the AS21 system by site personnel and then Cayen Systems transfers them into the PPICS. In this way, the US Department of Education has a "snapshot" of how teachers across the country feel about the impact the 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs are having on regular student participants' academic performance and other behaviors. See Appendix 5 for a copy of the Federal Teacher Survey.


The total number of regular student attendees was 12,009; however the total number of Teacher Surveys entered into AS21 by all subgrantees was only 4,772. Two sample sizes are reported for each item: one for all the teachers who answered the item and a second for teachers who did not mark "Did Not Need to Improve." The percentage of students who "Did Not Need to Improve" is based on the total number of surveys collected for the item, while the percentages reported for the extent to which students improved are based on only those students who needed to improve, excluding the students who "Did Not Need to Improve."

**1. To what extent has your student changed their behavior in terms of turning in homework on time? (Total n=4900; Needs to Improve n=3701)**




Teachers reported 57.33% of the students needing to improve their turning in of homework on time improved. This can be a direct result of the extra homework help and tutoring South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC student received in the programs. Only 4.59% showed any decline in this behavior.

**2. To what extent has your student changed their behavior in terms of completing homework to your satisfaction? (Total n=4900; Needs to Improve n=3873)**




Teachers reported 77.38% of the students needing to improve completing their homework to their teacher's satisfaction improved. This is mostly due to the extra homework help and tutoring they received in the program. Only 6.25% showed any decline in this behavior.

 (Total n=4900; Needs to Improve n=3918)




Teachers reported 77.38% of the students needing to change their participation in class improved. This is mostly due to the extra homework help, tutoring counseling and enrichment activities in which they participated. Only 4.5% showed any decline in this behavior.

 (Total n=4900; Needs to Improve n=3891)




Teachers reported 67.18% of the students needing to change their volunteering for extra credit or more responsibility in class improved. Only 3.47% showed any decline in this behavior.

**5. To what extent has your student changed their behavior in terms of attending class regularly? (Total n=4900; Needs to Improve n=3094)**




Teachers reported 66.58% of the students needing to change their class attendance improved. This may be attributable to the additional motivation they derived from a desire to participate the after school activities. Only 5.01% showed any decline in class attendance.

**6. To what extent has your student changed their behavior in terms of being attentive in class? (Total n=4900; Needs to Improve n=3924)**




Teachers reported 75.67% of the students needing to change their attentiveness in class improved. This may be attributable to the additional motivation they derived from a desire to participate the after school activities. Only 6.73% showed any decline in class attendance.

 (Total n=4900; Needs to Improve n=3541)




Teachers reported 70.81% of the students needing to change their being well behaved in class improved. This may be attributable to the additional opportunities to interact with others in varied settings during the after school activities. Only 8.59% showed any decline in behaving well in class attendance.

 (Total n=4900; Needs to Improve n=4110)




Teachers reported 79.49% of the students needing to change their academic performance improved. This may be attributable to the additional instruction, tutoring and enrichment they received during the after school activities. Only 5.72% showed any decline in academic performance.

**9. To what extent has your student changed their behavior in terms of coming to school motivated to learn? (Total n=4900; Needs to Improve n=3833)**



Teachers reported 72.69 % of the students needing to change their coming to school motivated to learn improved. This may be attributable to the additional motivation they derived from a desire to participate the after school activities. Only 5.83 % showed any decline in motivation to learn.

**10. To what extent has your student changed their behavior in terms of getting along with other students? (Total n=4900; Needs to Improve n=3427)**



Teachers reported 66.12% of the students needing to change their behavior in terms of getting along with others improved. This may be attributable to the additional opportunities to interact with others in varied settings during the after school activities. Only 7.44% showed any decline in getting along with others.

## **VIII. Compliance with 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC Data Reporting**

In order to get an accurate assessment of the achievements and challenges of the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs, it was necessary for the subgrantees to input a great deal of student data into the Cayen AS21 System. Twelve different subsets were examined for compliance with data reporting: daily after school student attendance; Math grades first the first and last marking period; English grades for the first and last marking periods; Math PASS scores; Reading PASS scores; gender; grade; racial group; IEP status; LEP status; Teacher Survey; and Free and Reduced Lunch status. Scoring was based on the following rubric: 0= provided no information; 0.5= provided 1-49% of information; 1= provided 50% or more of the information.

The highest total score possible was 12. Scores ranged from 2 to 12. Only 6 sites completed all the data sets needed, scoring a 12; 25 scored from 10 to 11.5; 55 scored from 8 to 9.5; the remaining 84 sites scored from 2 to 7.5. To see a full list of Compliance Scores by Site see Appendix 6.

It must be noted, programs who did not comply with the entry of the required data are responsible for preventing a more accurate picture of the achievements of the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs from being depicted in this report. Those programs that provided the most data should be interviewed to determine how they were able to do so.

## **IX. Subgrantees' Levels of Success in Reaching Stated Objectives**

Subgrantees proposed their own objectives and indicators based on the five focus areas contained in the South Carolina Department of Education's Request for Proposals: Academic Achievement; Attendance (in the regular school day); Behavior (in the regular school day); Family Literacy; and Sustainability. However, it was discovered that many programs proposed to meet objectives that fit into two additional focuses, "Nutrition and Fitness", and "General Enrichment." These were added to the analysis.

All programs were required to provide direct academic instruction and enrichment activities to improve the academic performance of participating students and help them meet and exceed state and local standards in core content areas such as reading, math, and science. Programs proposed objectives to reflect positive impact on attendance and behavior during the regular school. Family Literacy activities could only be offered to adult family members of students participating in a 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC program including services to support parental involvement and to advance the students' academic achievement. All programs were required to develop and implement a Sustainability plan to enable them to continue to operate by the end of their funding period. See Appendix 7 for details on the contributions received by each subgrantee.

Figure 15 below reflects the progress of all programs in meeting their stated objectives. Programs that recorded their progress selected one of the following descriptors: "Met", "Made Progress", "Not Met", "Unable to Measure", or "Dropped". Objectives without a descriptor entered were coded as, "Not Recorded".

Collectively:

- 85.5% of the objectives relating to Academic Achievement were met or made progress.
- 73.3% of the objectives relating to improving day school attendance were met or made progress.
- 73.1% of the objectives relating to improving behavior in the day school were met or made progress.
- 89.1% of the objectives relating to Family Literacy were met or made progress.
- 80.5% of the objectives relating to program Sustainability were met or made progress.
- 80.0% of the objectives relating to improving Nutrition and Fitness were met or made progress.
- 87.2% of the objectives relating to improving day school attendance were met or made progress.

Based on these self-reported outcomes for progress on the stated objectives, 78.1% of the total number of objectives were met or made progress toward reaching them. It is not possible to ascertain the outcomes of 13.2% of the objectives since they were not recorded; however, based on the available data, in general, the programs appear to have made progress on meeting their stated objectives.

## **X. Summary and Findings**

The summary of findings and conclusions reflect what has been learned based on the review and analysis of all of the available. To inform all stakeholders, the focus of the study was to uncover how the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs statewide performed. Below are the key findings and conclusions. Recommendations for improvement complete the study.

### **Summary of Key Findings**

#### ***South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC Student Characteristics***

1. Student data was collected by all 170 afterschool program sites and recorded in AS21.
2. Over 85 % of the students attended for at least 30 days, placing 12,009 students as Regular Attendees as defined by the US Department of Education. These are outstanding results that indicate the programs are very effective in maintaining the interest of the students.
3. Students from all grades, Pre-K through 12 participated in the programs. The largest number of students attended was in grades 2 through 8. High school student participants in grades 9 through 12 totaled 850.
4. The South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs served 51% females and 49% males. This minor difference in the number of female and male students served indicates the programs appealed to both boys and girls almost equally.
5. Of those students, whose race was reported (7,467), 72% were black and 6% were Hispanic 19% white students and the remaining percentage of the population 3% included all other groups. These results indicate that the programs served a diverse population of students.
6. Over 90 % of the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students qualify for free and reduced lunch status. This indicated that the programs are serving high need students.

### ***South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC Activities***

7. The APR report indicates 48 % of the service hours for Youth were spent in Academic Enrichment Learning.
8. Activities to Promote Youth Leadership, Homework Help, and Tutoring accounted for 22% of the hours spent.
9. Recreational and other Youth activities accounted for 23 % of the time spent.

### ***South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC Student Academic Performance Outcomes***

10. The English/Language Arts PASS results for South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC at all grade levels indicate 64% passed.
11. The Mathematic PASS results for South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC at all grade levels indicate 59 % passed.
12. A significant number of South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students who failed either or both the English/Language Arts and Mathematics PASS in 2012 were able to increase their scores to passing in 2013, 29% and 27%, respectively.
13. Students who attended the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs 60 days more were more likely to pass their standardized math and reading tests than those who attended less than 60 days. The probability of this occurring by chance was calculated to be less than 1%. This is a significant finding since it demonstrates the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs can have a profound effect on student outcomes on achievement tests provided they participate regularly. A further comparison of the programs that participated in the CIPAS process revealed that programs scoring in the top half of the distribution (2.7 to 4) had 7% more students attend more than sixty days as compared to the bottom half (1 to 2.6), 68.3% to 61.3%, respectively.
14. Over 65% of the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students' Language Arts grades remained the same or improved from the first marking period to the last marking period.

15. Over 65% of the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC students' Mathematics grades remained the same or improved from the first marking period to the last marking period.

### ***Federal Teacher Survey Results***

16. Teachers reported 57 % of the students needing to improve their turning in of homework on time improved. This can be a direct result of the extra homework help and tutoring South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC student received in the programs. Only 4.59% showed any decline in this behavior.

17. Teachers reported 77% of the students needing to improve completing their homework to their teacher's satisfaction improved. This is mostly due to the extra homework help and tutoring they received in the program. Only 6% showed any decline in this behavior.

18. Teachers reported 77% of the students needing to change their participation in class improved. This is mostly due to the extra homework help, tutoring counseling and enrichment activities in which they participated. Less than 5% showed any decline in this behavior.

19. Teachers reported 67% of the students needing to change their volunteering for extra credit or more responsibility in class improved. Less than 4% showed any decline in this behavior.

20. Teachers reported 67% of the students needing to change their class attendance improved. This may be attributable to the additional motivation they derived from a desire to participate the after school activities. Only 5% showed any decline in class attendance.

21. Teachers reported 76% of the students needing to change their attentiveness in class improved. This may be attributable to the additional motivation they derived from a desire to participate the after school activities. Less than 7% showed any decline in class attendance.

22. Teachers reported 71% of the students needing to change their being well behaved in class improved. This may be attributable to the additional opportunities to interact with others in

varied settings during the after school activities. Less than 9% showed any decline in behaving well in class attendance.

23. Teachers reported 79% of the students needing to change their academic performance improved. This may be attributable to the additional instruction, tutoring and enrichment they received during the after school activities. Less than 6% showed any decline in academic performance.

24. Teachers reported 72 % of the students needing to change their coming to school motivated to learn improved. This may be attributable to the additional motivation they derived from a desire to participate the after school activities. Less than 6 % showed any decline in motivation to learn.

25. Teachers reported 66% of the students needing to change their behavior in terms of getting along with others improved. This may be attributable to the additional opportunities to interact with others in varied settings during the after school activities. Less than 8% showed any decline in getting along with others.

### ***Compliance with 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC Data Reporting***

26. The highest total score possible was 12. Scores ranged from 2 to 12. Only 6 sites completed all the data sets needed, scoring a 12; 25 scored from 10 to 11.5; 55 scored from 8 to 9.5; the remaining 84 sites scored from 2 to 7.5. These scores are indicative of a serious problem many sites had entering data into AS21.

### ***Subgrantees' Levels of Success in Reaching Stated Objectives***

27. 86% of the objectives relating to Academic Achievement were met or made progress.

28. 73% of the objectives relating to improving day school attendance were met or made progress.

29. 73% of the objectives relating to improving behavior in the day school were met or made progress.

30. 89% of the objectives relating to Family Literacy were met or made progress.

31. 81% of the objectives relating to program Sustainability were met or made progress.

32. 80% of the objectives relating to improving Nutrition and Fitness were met or made progress.

33. 87 % of the objectives relating to improving day school attendance were met or made progress.

34. 78% of the total number of objectives were met or progress was made toward reaching them. It is not possible to ascertain the outcomes of 13.2% of the objectives since they were not recorded; however, based on the available data, in general, the programs appear to have made progress on meeting their stated objectives.

### **Conclusions**

1. South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup>CCLC's are serving a large, diverse population of students, most of whom are from low income and are members of racial minority groups.

2. Data strongly suggests that students who attended a South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup>CCLC for 60 or more days were very likely to improve their English/Language Arts and Mathematics achievement as measured by the PASS assessments for those subjects.

3. The main focus of the South Carolina 21<sup>st</sup>CCLC program is to offer students activities that will directly enhance their academic achievement. The majority of activities provided by the subgrantees at their sites were academic in nature. An array of other activities most likely had the effect of motivating students to attend on a regular basis.

4. Over 85 % of the students attended for at least 30 days, thus fulfilling the federal requirement to be considered as “Regular Attendees.” This is a remarkable achievement.

5. The federal teacher surveys that were returned indicate for all behaviors queried, South Carolina 21StCCLC students have made consistent and significant improvements. These teachers provided independent opinions reflecting the change in behaviors of their students since attending the 21CCLC programs.

6. Data collection and entry into AS21 was problematic. If more complete data was available the assertions in this study could have been made with more confidence.

### **Recommendations**

1. Clearly, additional training needs to be provided to those personnel who were unable to enter data into the AS21 virtual database in sufficient quantities and with accuracy. This is the greatest limitation on the veracity of this study.

2. Frequently monitor the inputting of data into AS21 and bring sanctions to bear on programs that are not in compliance (See Appendix 6). More detailed data including all of the compliance data by site is available, but was too voluminous to include in the study.

3. Goals, objectives and indicators should be set by the South Carolina Department of Education and not left to the grantees to design. This will provide a means for more uniformly measuring success in reaching expected outcomes.
