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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

St. John's High School, the only public high school on Johns Island, continues to be conscientious about its commitment to ensure student success. With significant emphasis on improving the quality of instruction, we are proud of our progress and the accomplishments of our students and staff during the 2007-2008 school year. Among these accomplishments are an increase of approximately 66 percent in the amount of scholarships offered to our students and an increase in the graduation rate. Additionally, our JROTC Program was named an Honor Unit with Distinction, and numerous cadets were recognized with outstanding awards. Students at St. John's continued to receive local, regional, and state recognition and awards for their efforts in the arts, including but not limited to awards in the Coastal Carolina Regional Fair, the Junior Federal Duck Stamp Contest, and the Extraordinary Arts Tri-County Exhibition. The 6-A Varsity Football Player of the Year was a St. John's High School senior. Art teacher Donna Dowling was the recipient of the first Mary White Teacher of the Year Award, and math teacher Bridget Goosby was named St. John's Teacher of the Year.

Recognizing that it takes "an entire village to educate a child," we appreciate the increased efforts and support of our community. St. John's High School held its first Islander Family Night during this school year, and a community and school focus group convened to seek input and to ensure continued dialogue among all stakeholders.

At St. John's High School, we offer a comprehensive curriculum designed to meet the needs of students seeking post-graduation degrees, a military career, or entrance into the workforce. Our curriculum includes college preparatory, honors, Advanced Placement, and Career and Technology Education (CTE) courses.

During the 2007-2008 school year, our school completed its initial High Schools That Work Technical Assistance Visit. The team of teacher and administrator peers from outside our district recognized—among many accomplishments—the commitment of our teachers to provide extra help and support for our students. They also validated the next steps we had already identified through the self-study process: (1) to develop and implement a restructured Ninth Grade Academy, (2) to continue efforts to align standards and increase rigor of instruction and levels of student engagement, (3) to strive for consistency in leadership, (4) to focus on improving school/community relationships, and (5) to maintain consistency in the teaching staff. Our school remains accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

As we work to implement these next steps, we will continue to solicit parent, community, and business support through partnerships, our School Improvement Council, booster clubs, advisory boards, and Parent Teacher Student Association. We invite you to visit our school to see the good things that are happening and to become involved in ensuring the success of our students.
