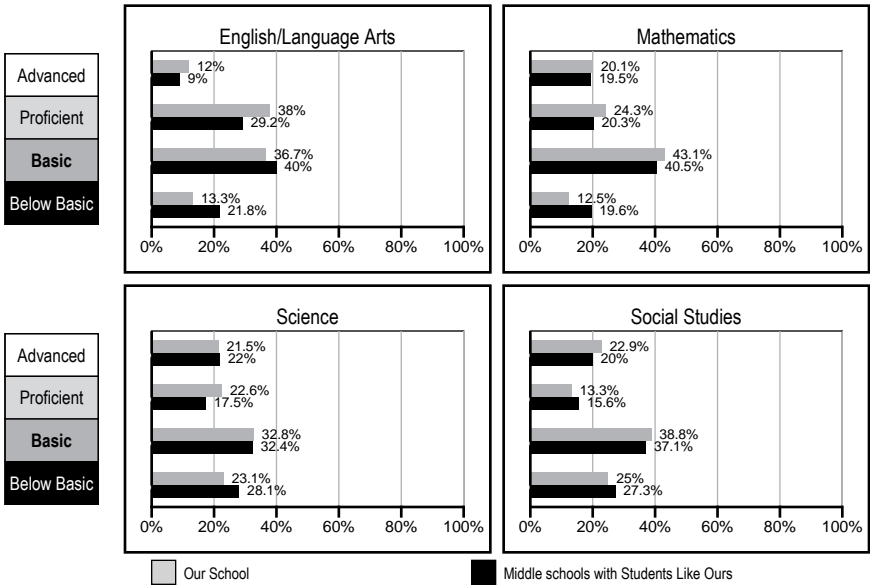

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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Marrington Elementary serves PreK through 5th grade and continues to offer students many and varied opportunities to meet our high academic standards as well as character building and physical activity. Programs offered include chorus, Move With Marrington, Character Virtue of the Month, reading intervention, SuccessMaker computer program, and various PTO sponsored family activities. Gifted and talented instruction is available for qualifying students in third, fourth, and fifth grades. Marrington Elementary is one of the 19 schools in South Carolina that has been recognized by the State Oversight Committee for closing the achievement gap six consecutive times and has earned the Palmetto Silver Award on four occasions, including 2007-2008. The elementary wing has two up-to-date computer labs, a full-time lab manager, and computers and SmartBoards in all core classrooms. All classrooms are equipped with internet access which provides access to United Streaming, an internet-based educational video site.

Marrington Middle School of the Arts offers diverse instructional programs which allow our students to distinguish themselves for outstanding academic and artistic performance. Instruction is enhanced through SuccessMaker, Accelerated Reader, and tutorial classes. Advanced students may take algebra and honors English for high school credit. All classrooms are equipped with computers and SmartBoards. We offer unique programs in fine arts, such as strings, dance, and theatre arts, in addition to performances and artists in residence. Marrington Middle teachers have logged more than 300 hours collectively in staff development, specifically in arts integration and Making Middle Grades Work. This training empowers our teachers with the most current, research-based, and challenging methods of instruction.

Marrington School has an active volunteer program. A workroom is available to volunteers in both wings and is equipped with a television, VCR/DVD player, and age-appropriate toys and furniture. The PTSO is an integral part of the school. The volunteers assume many clerical tasks such as organizing Wednesday folders and copying teacher-generated work. This group also strengthens student and teacher morale by coordinating school dances, fund-raisers, duty-free lunch, and numerous student and teacher incentive programs.

Our highly professional staff boasts two earned doctorates, six National Board Certified teachers, and 30 teachers with Master's degrees. The average number of year's experience of the staff is 16. The collaborative effort of the administration, faculty, staff, PTSO, students, and community assures that our students become productive members of an ever-changing society, empowered with the skills needed to maximize their social and intellectual potential.
