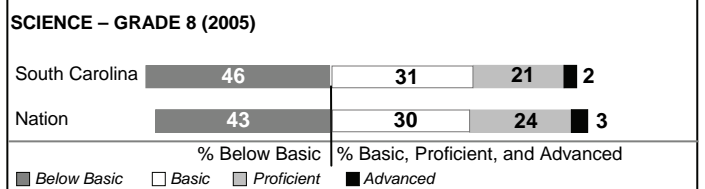
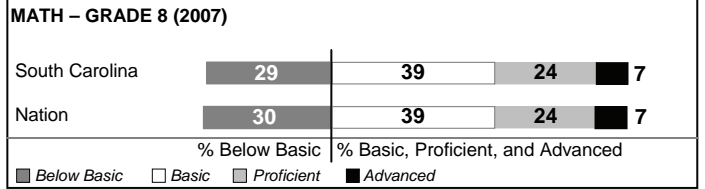
PASS PERFORMANCE

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

The third year of Springfield Middle School's existence has given us many successes and challenges. All of our faculty and staff, parents, and students contributed to the success of our school. During the school year we accomplished several important goals. We completed the second year of our Making Middle Grades Work site plan. Through MMGW, we developed a literacy plan which will help all of our students in their reading and writing skills. Springfield Middle also worked to help students transition to middle school from elementary school or from middle school to high school. A third goal involved reviewing assessment and how to connect assessment to what is taught in the classroom.

For the second year in a row, Springfield Middle was recognized by the South Carolina Education Oversight Committee for closing the achievement gap for historically underachieving students. We were given a monetary reward for this and the Palmetto Silver Award. Both were based on student PACT scores.

We had several other awards for the 2008-2009 school year. The most significant of these awards was being named the Law Related Education State Middle School of the Year. Our mock trial team was the primary contributor to this award due to their repeat as State Mock Trial Champions. SMS was also named a Green Power Solar School by the York Electric Co-Op and Santee Cooper. This allowed a solar panel to be constructed on our campus, and 6th grade science teachers were trained for an energy unit. There were many other awards that were listed in our Year in Review, a newsletter sent to parents.

Our challenges included growth in enrollment and school funding. We will move into mobile classrooms during the 2009-2010 school year. We are continuing to grow between 50-100 students per year. A lack of funding has eliminated our reading specialist position for the 2009-2010 school year and could impact our class sizes for years to come. These and other challenges are also in our Year in Review.

Our year was packed with many successes and challenges, as we attempted to provide the best education possible for our students. We also wish to promote better communication with parents and the community in the future.
