- \* Placement Rate --- The percentage of career and technology completers available for placement over a 3-year period who are actually placed in postsecondary instruction, military services, or employment.

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## Report of Director and School Improvement Council

"Champions Under Construction." The success of the 2009-2010 school year was centered on the belief that within each student lies the capacity to accomplish far greater things than most of us could imagine. Our faculty/staff and all stakeholders in Greenwood County contributed to the success of our school. From the community service projects to the recognition of students at Awards Night, the Russell Career Center continues to engage students with hands-on instruction which prepares them for life beyond high school.

Highlights/accomplishments for the year include the following: One Hundred Six Program Completers; Fifty-One Work Ethic Certificate Recipients; 100% Club: National Healthcare Foundation Skills Assessment; Cosmetology State Board Licensure Test; and Certified Nursing Assistant Licensure Test. Service Projects included: Salvation Army Canned Food Drive; United Way Campaign; March of Dimes; Hearts for Haiti Relief Campaign; Relay for Life; and Cakes for Cancer. State Winners in SkillsUSA Competition: First Place Machine Tool Division; Second Place PLTW Engineering Design and Development; Third Place Carpentry Division; and Third Place Cosmetology Division. Eight-Time Palmetto Gold Winner; National Blue Ribbon Lighthouse School; Project Lead The Way Certified School; Member of Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) High Schools That Work; and Accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACSCASI).

In spite of the issues regarding state funding for education, our expectations remained high as we provided students with the positive educational and occupational experiences they needed to become well-rounded mature adults. Without question, we succeeded in developing the champion within our students!
