Report of Director and School Improvement Council

The Lee County Career & Technology Center has experienced a great 2009-10 school year.

Approximately 589 students were served with 12 programs. These programs are offered in accordance with the standards set by the State Department of Education and the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. A number of our students attended conferences, workshops and competitive events. Some of our students placed at both local and state competitions and received recognition for these accomplishments. Each year these competitions help build character and leadership skills for our students. We encourage all of our students to step outside the box and challenge themselves to reach a little higher. We have worked closely with Lee Central High School to improve instruction and curriculum content for our students.

Being located on the same campus, we are better able to meet the academic and Career & Technology needs of your students. This is a win-win situation for all Lee County High School students. This coming school year we are adding 9 courses at the career center. Most of these courses will be open to 9th grade students. By allowing more 9th grade students to enroll we will be able to better prepare them for academic success as well as the HSAP.
