Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating

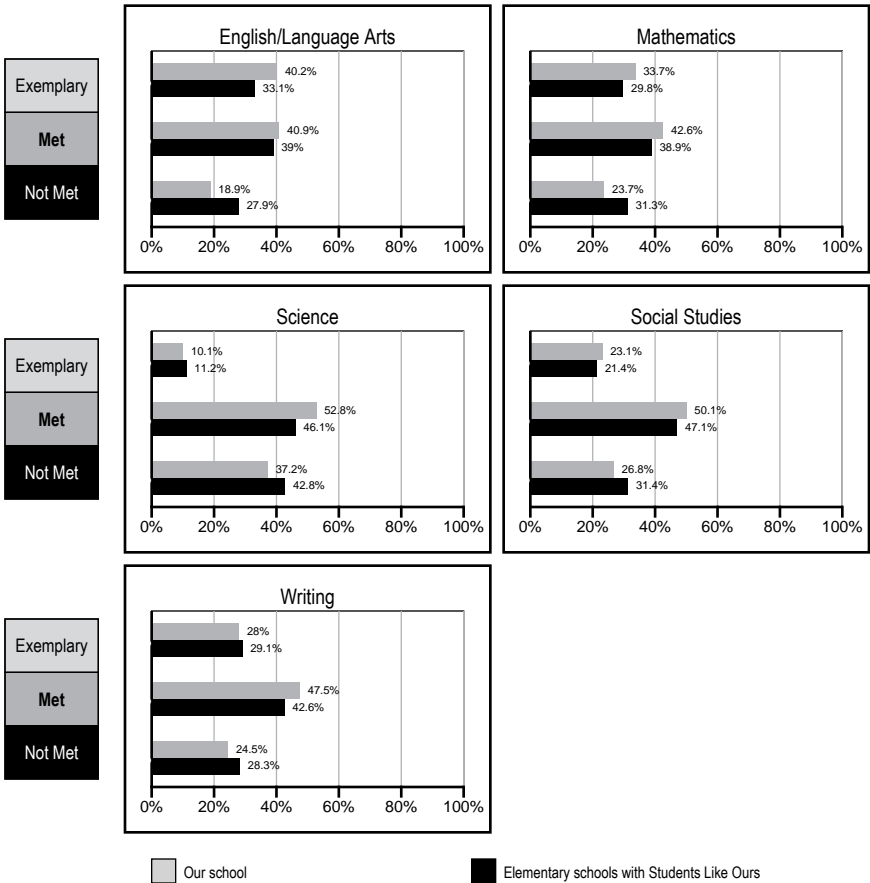

Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Sedgefield Intermediate School provides a culturally sensitive and diverse learning environment for approximately 665 third, fourth and fifth grade students in Goose Creek, SC. Sedgefield Intermediate fosters a safe, orderly and healthy school where every student is challenged and empowered to be successful in our highly competitive world. Teachers and staff are committed to providing our students the pathways to excellence through authentic learning experiences that embrace the use of technology, engage in collaborative experiences, and challenge them to sharpen and develop problem solving skills. Sedgefield Intermediate’s teachers plan collaboratively, sharing professional experiences and knowledge to ensure that learning is our focus. During this school year students demonstrated their content mastery of the South Carolina Curriculum and Standards through improved scores on PASS and MAP.

In our effort to embrace the Sedgefield community we continued to collaborate with Goose Creek High School implementing the Teen Trendsetters Reading Mentoring program providing students weekly reading mentors. In addition, we established and facilitated a Community Resource Center that provides student enrichment, library usage and fundamental computer use skills to the community during extended school hours and on identified Saturdays. The PTO assisted in furthering our efforts of community engagement by strengthening and fostering new business partner relationships.

We remain excited about the use of technology as an embedded resource in instruction to enhance authentic learning experiences. In addition to the use of SMART interactive white boards, document cameras, and student computer work stations in each classroom, students also participated on the school’s robotic team and participated in regional robotic competitions. We were also proud to host a STEM Camp that provided students the opportunity to explore “Wonders of the Lowcountry” through robotics, computer animations, electronic snap transistors, camera microscopes and a host of other science, technology, engineering, and math experiences.

Schoolwide, we continued a Positive Behavior Intervention System, which interconnected with our character education program. Our character trait of the month fostered citizenship and service learning. Each class recognized a Student of the Month who best exemplified the monthly character trait. We continue to be excited about the many opportunities that we provide students and embrace our parents and the community to focus on our centerpoint, developing a lifelong love for learning.
