Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating

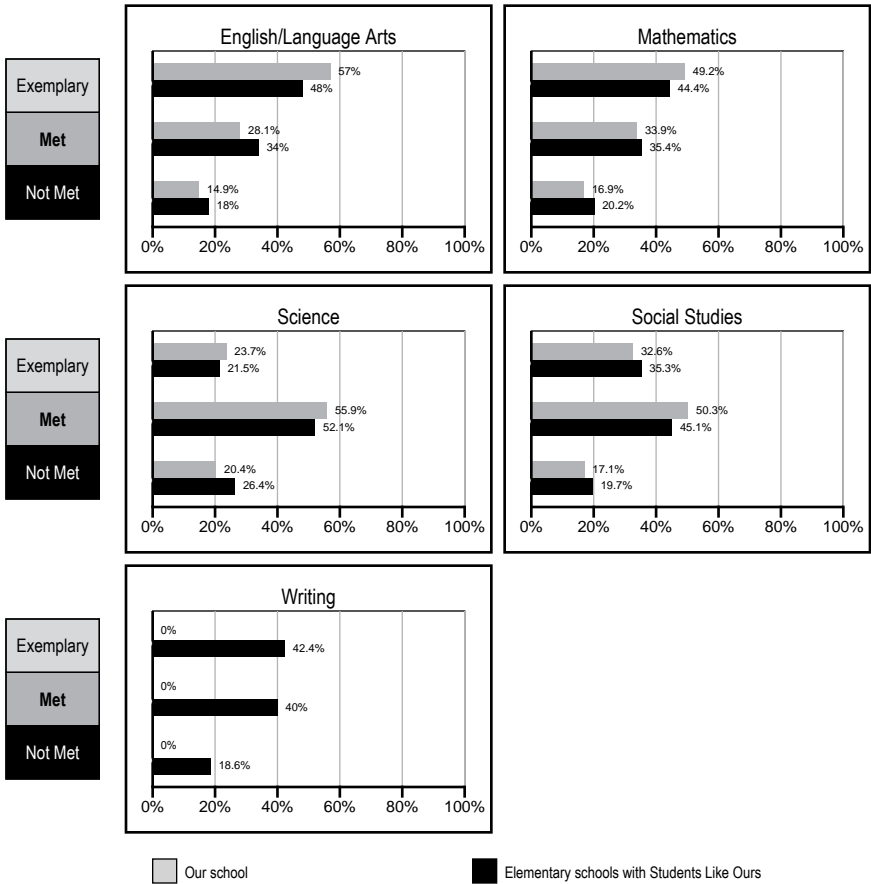

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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

We have had another incredible year at Lyman Elementary. Our school is located in one of Spartanburg County's fastest growing areas. Lyman Elementary houses 670 students in pre-kindergarten through 4th grade. The faculty and staff of 75 serve our students in a state of the art facility. It is our belief that we are all stakeholders in the educational lives of every student. Through innovative and challenging educational experiences, we strive to meet the individual needs of all students at Lyman.

Students learn reading through a balanced literacy approach which includes the use of the Rigby Literacy Program. We have continued our implementation of South Carolina Math for our math instruction. Science standards are addressed through exciting hands-on activities in our classrooms and through instruction involving the use of grade-level science kits. Our school joins the other schools in District Five in the continued implementation of the Learning-Focused School initiative and the standards-based units that have been developed for each content area. This exciting school reform model provides greater focus on standards and curriculum for both teachers and students.

Opportunities for students are abundant at Lyman Elementary School. Students have access to computers in labs and in classrooms, as well as the use of digital cameras, video cameras, laser disks, scanners, and Interwrite boards.

Student leadership is encouraged through participation in Student Council, Pride Patrol, Captains of the Flag, and The Morning Show Crew.

We are grateful for our continuing partnership with our PTO and the following local businesses: Auto Zone, Chick-fil-a, Food Lion, Jocassee Designs, Zaxby's, McDonalds, and Bi-lo. Students serve the school community through a variety of service learning projects such as food drives, Relay for Life, Jump Rope for Life, March of Dimes, and Zig the Pig for cancer research.

Through the hard work and dedication of our students, staff, and parents, Lyman Elementary was named a Palmetto Silver Award winner for absolute performance and closing the achievement gap. Together we will continue to work to make Lyman Elementary an even great place for our students.
