REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

The Blue Ridge Elementary School Family of students, faculty, staff, parents, and community rallied for a fabulous 2010-11 school year. We began our sophomore year with the following curricular goals: incorporate writing across the curriculum, incorporate balanced literacy strategies, use inquiry-based teaching strategies in math and science, infuse technology into all subject areas and develop a school-wide volunteer program to include parents, retirees, and other community members that enhances student achievement.

As we journeyed through the year, the Blue Ridge Elementary School Family was honored to receive many accolades and recognitions including 2011 Safe Schools Award. Club 245, our 21st century learning center, served over 120 students in grades 2-5 in reading, math and technology. For the second year in a row, one of our students won our district's State Superintendent's Writing Contest. Our Lego League Team advanced to the state competition. And five students earned a spot on the State's Honor Chorus. Our staff generated over \$5000 for our local Relay for Life and was our district's 2nd top contributor to United Way. Our students earned 2nd place in the spirit competition at Special Olympics. We implemented the WATCH D.O.G.S. (Dads of Great Students) program into our school. Our staff believes that fathers and father figures are crucial components to the social, emotional and academic well-being of our students. Blue Ridge Elementary School was selected to partner with Clemson University in the Neighborhood Promise Grant. Blue Ridge Elementary School also boasted a final four District Teacher of the Year. Additionally, our partnership with Clemson University's Call Me Mister Program afforded us an additional summer program for rising 4th graders. Our school year ended with an Early Childhood summer program for rising Kindergarten and 1st grade students that focused on Early Literacy and Math. We have had a tremendous year!
