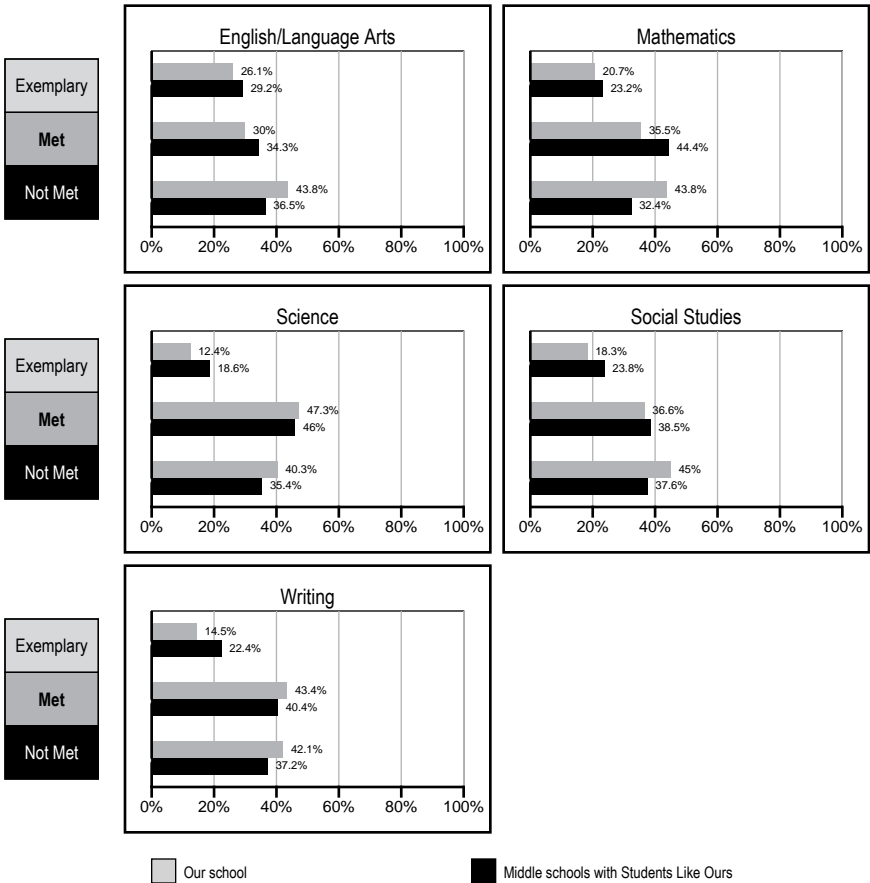

## Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Great Falls Middle School is a grades 6-8 school in rural Chester County in the central upstate of South Carolina. The average daily attendance for the 2010-2011 school year was 212 students. Great Falls Middle School met 94.1% of Palmetto Assessment of State Standards (PASS) objectives for Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) as defined by federal legislation No Child Left Behind for 2010. 73.8% of 7th Graders scored Met or Exemplary on 2010 PASS Math. 100% of 8th Grade Honors English and Algebra I students received high school credit. Two 8th grade students qualified as SC Junior Scholars for their high scores on the PSAT and a GFMS 8th grader won the State Superintendent of Education's Writing Contest for Chester County. Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) average scores for 6th Grade Reading and Language Usage and 8th Grade Math exceeded the national mean this spring. All students had double blocks of Language Arts and Math this year.

Great Falls Middle School became a Winthrop NetSCOPE Partner School in 2010-2011. Several staff members attended the Education and Business Summit state (Greenville) and national (Nashville) conferences this summer. 10 staff members hold Master's degrees or above, with years' experience for staff range from 3 to 34 years with an average of 15.3 years. 3 teachers hold National Board Certification. The staff received \$85,725.00 in grants this year. The faculty participated in a book study of What Great Teachers Do Differently by Todd Whitaker. Staff development for individuals included: Response to Intervention, Microsoft Office 2011, ETV, Teaching Struggling Readers, Plato Web, Making Middle Grades Work, Explicit Direct Instruction, and e-chalk web page training.

Special programs conducted at the school this year included: a Black History Program in February with featured speaker TV/Radio personality Beatrice Thompson, a special program called ¡Fiesta! In which 6th graders participated with the high school Spanish class students, a program entitled Internet Safety & Cyber Bullying presented by Patti Fowler from the State Attorney General's Office, and student incentives programs included Student of the Month, Good Behavior Assemblies, and Early Lunch for Honor Roll students.

Great Falls Middle School students and staff participated in many service learning projects. Students participated in Hoops for Heart for the American Heart Association in P.E. class, collecting \$851.26 in funds in memory of Mr. Warren Tisdale. To support the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life, students paid \$2 to wear jeans on two dates during the spring, while teachers paid \$10 each to wear jeans the week after spring break to raise money for the American Cancer Society. Middle School students donated change for Pennies for Patients and to assist the local food bank, students collected canned foods as a competition among homerooms.

During the 2010-2011 school year, Great Falls Middle merged with Great Falls High School to become Great Falls Middle/High. In 2011-2012, the school will have one BEDS code, which will recognize the school officially as one school according to the State Department of Education. At this time, Great Falls Middle will work toward becoming a Making Middle Grades Work certified school so that student achievement will prepare them for both high school work and post-secondary work.
