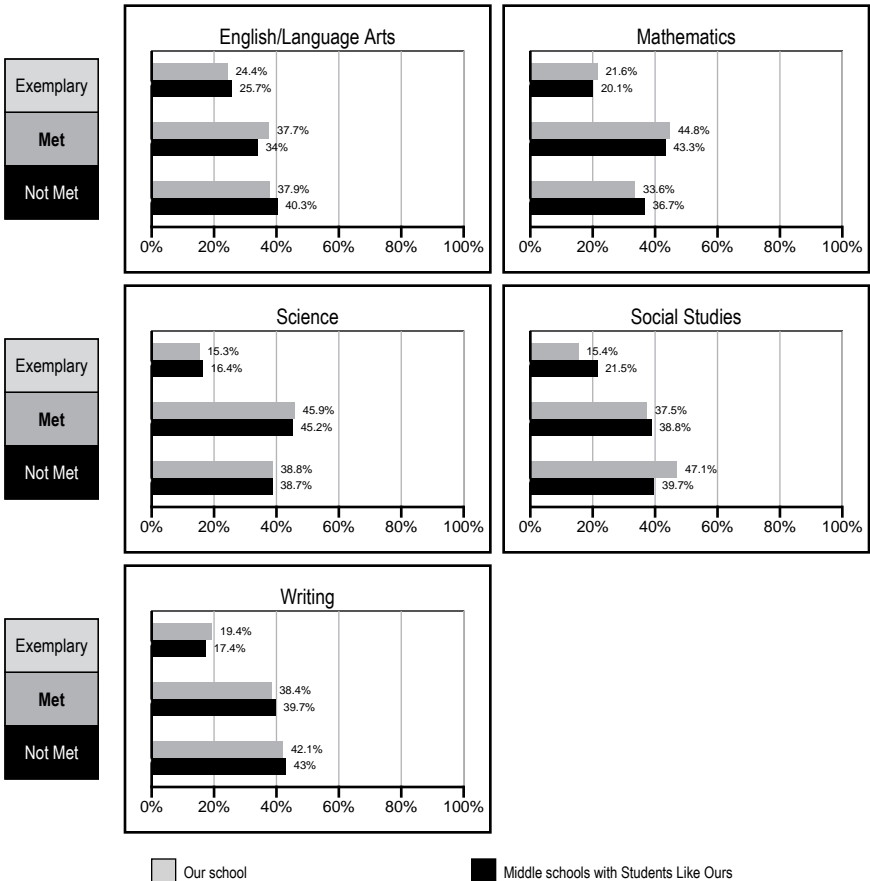

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## Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

The 2010-2011 school year has been a busy and exciting one at Manning Junior High School. This year we benefited greatly from our association with the School Improvement Grant (SIG). We have received more in-depth, in-service training, including the Technology Conference in Greenville, SIG workshops and Making Middle Grades Work. We have also added three academic coaches and a Turnaround Specialist to our staff. This year we have concentrated on creating Small Learning Communities for our students and implementing a greater use of data. We utilize common assessments throughout the school. The common assessments and the use of MAP and other diagnostic testing enables us to make rapid decisions about moving students within the Small Learning Communities to meet the needs of our students. We are also utilizing direct instruction in reading and math. Each student is individually tested to determine their current achievement levels and needs. The entire faculty is actively engaged in teaching reading and this has furthered the sense of community at Manning Junior High School. We are excited about our progress this year and feel that the future looks bright for the Manning Junior High School Monarchs.
