Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating

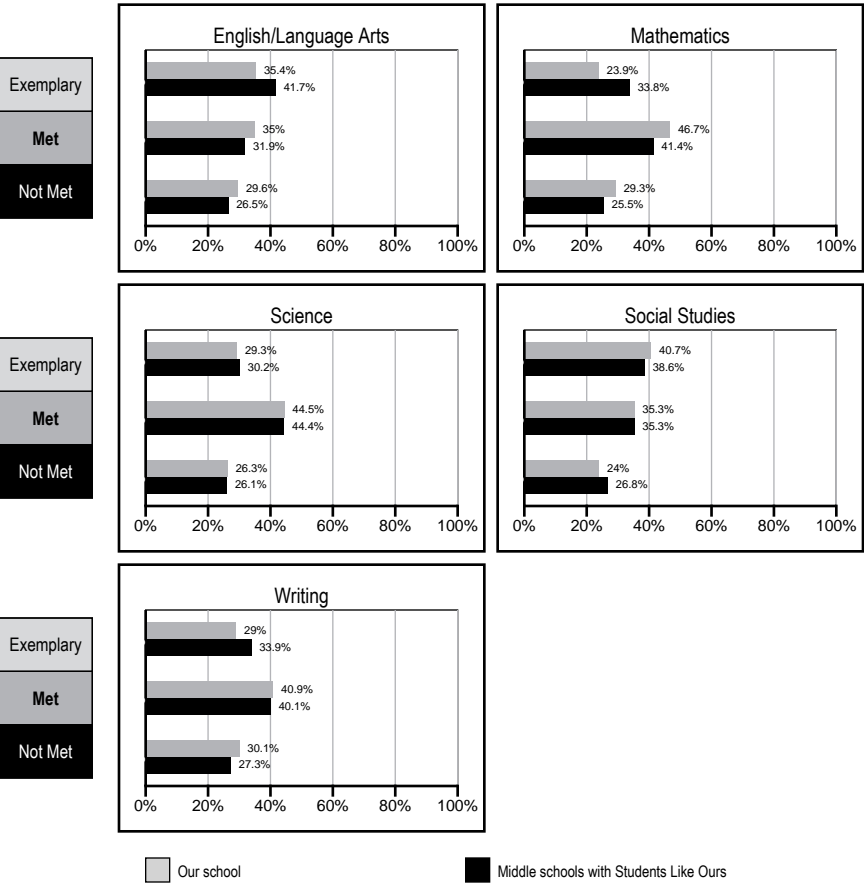
