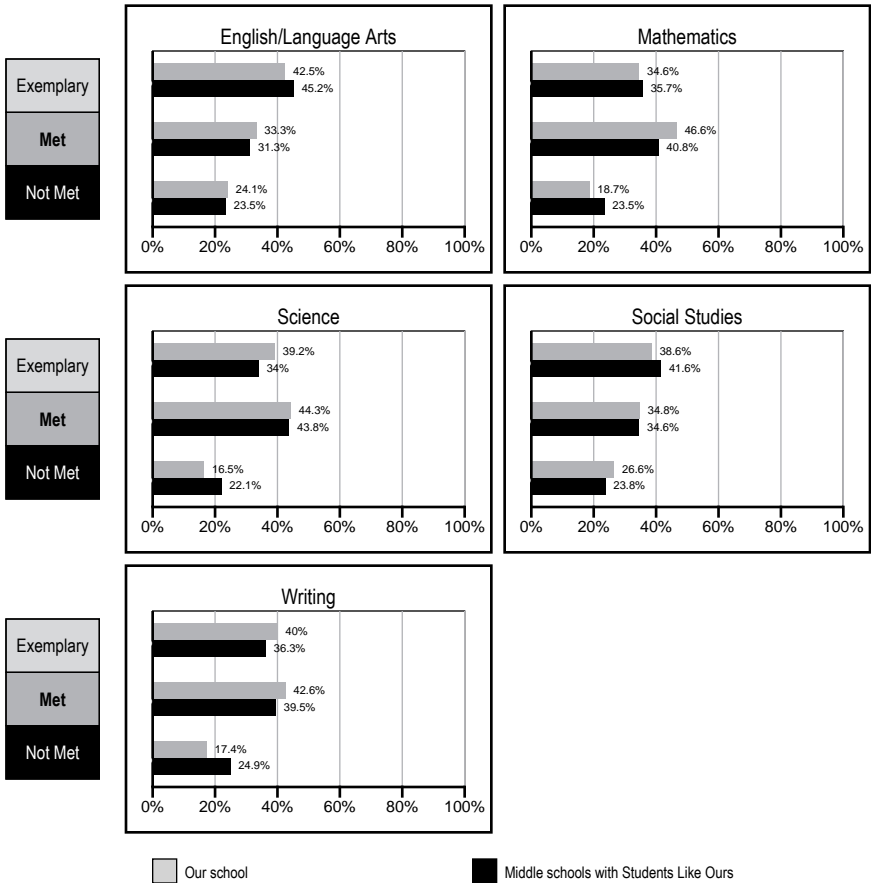

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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Lugoff-Elgin Middle School enjoyed another great year of academic, athletic, and extra-curricular success in 2010-2011. LEMS was awarded both a Palmetto Gold and Silver Award by the SC Department of Education for academic achievement and closing achievement gaps in 2010. Additionally, 16 eighth grade students were named Junior Scholars while 4 seventh grade students were selected to be Duke TIP Scholars. Four students placed in the Lugoff Optimist Oratorical Contest and 2 placed in the Zone Competition. Student artwork was regularly displayed at the Kershaw County Fine Arts Center's Bassett Gallery, and the second annual Student Art Gallery opening was held in the spring. The Lugoff-Elgin Middle School 8th grade Band received an overall excellent rating at the SCBDA Concert Festival.

Athletically, the LEMS Mighty Leopard Wrestling Team won the state title and one Leopard won an individual title. The athletic director and head football coach reached a milestone in his career with his 100th win. The Lady Leopards volleyball team was undefeated for the second consecutive season.

Students and staff exemplified the school motto, "Understanding Hearts and Positive Attitudes make a Great School," through a variety of community service projects. Sixth grade students collected supplies and prepared over 240 care packages for soldiers in Afghanistan. In addition, they visited and performed for local residents in rest homes. As a school, over \$7,000 for was raised for Relay for Life. These activities along with many others help our students give back to our community. Lugoff-Elgin Middle School is successful because of the combined efforts of our faculty, staff, students, and community.
