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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Summerville Elementary School, "Where Leadership is an Art", is a neighborhood school nestled within the heart of Summerville. Our mission is to lead the way every learner every day, with rigor, relevance, and relationships. Our goal is to create leaders of self by teaching skills of self-discipline, self-awareness, and self-confidence. We are proud to have been named the 25th Lighthouse School in the world through The Leader in Me program.

We celebrate the growth we have seen in our school this past year. SES received the Palmetto Silver Award for student improvement. Our teachers were engaged in monthly debriefings to analyze student data in order to improve instruction and meet the diverse needs of our learners. Every one of our students, 4K – 5th grade, have their own data notebooks where they set personal and academic goals and track their progress throughout the year. These notebooks are used during student-led conferences with parents and peers. At our annual Parent Information Night, teachers share our school goals and classroom goals with parents to ensure a successful year. Students are involved in leadership roles for parent nights, PTA meetings, Arts Festival, Leadership Day, Award Ceremonies and various family nights.

We attribute our successes to our dedicated students, teachers, parents, and community. We are fortunate to have a deeply involved business community that supports our efforts inside the classroom by offering their time and expertise to co-teach lessons with teachers. This Adopt-a-Teacher model allows our students to experience life skills through the eyes of professionals in the field. They are truly impacting a generation of learners at SES.

Our systematic approach to interventions allowed us to offer instructional support to our students in kindergarten through fifth grades in the area of reading and literacy. We successfully incorporated an Accelerated First concept this year, providing an environment that immerses our at-risk learners in literature. Students participating in these programs showed a year's growth in their reading level. We also utilized a Math and Science coach to work with teachers on standards alignment and curriculum development. We are proud to recognize our Robotics team, which placed first in the state for Presentation.

Our day begins with students presenting the news and ends with them giving the afternoon announcements. They are involved in decision-making that includes participation in interviews for potential teacher candidates. We are committed to keeping our students at the centerpoint of everything we do. We set our yearly goals that include plans to benefit each and every child that we are honored to teach and mold for our future workforce.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
