

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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

The Bryson Elementary community enjoyed a very successful 2011-2012 school year. Our school received The Palmetto Silver Award for academic performance. We met 20 or our 21 performance objectives - narrowly missing the mark on one objective which would have qualified us for meeting AYP. Bryson Elementary has a warm, family-friendly school climate and places great emphasis on utilizing student performance data to guide instruction in our classrooms. Based on our data, 'algebraic expressions' in math and reading comprehension were given special emphasis this year. We also continued our focus on school-wide common assessments to determine needs for review, remediation, and pacing of instruction. We have continued many very successful programs such as the Children's Book Award Challenge, quarterly student achievement awards and the Accelerated Reader Challenge. This year saw the beginning of the "Popping Math Facts Challenge" to motivate students' math skills development. To continue our focus on character education, our students participated in the "Bucket Filling Challenge". This program focused on "catching students/staff" doing positive things throughout the school day. Students were awarded a cotton ball to help fill their classroom bucket for random acts of kindness, thoughtfulness, or courtesy. As buckets were filled, they were emptied into the 'school bucket'. Once the school bucket was filled a school-wide celebration was held. Our school continues to place a great emphasis on civic responsibility beyond the classroom. This year our students again collected food for the local food bank, raised funds for the March of Dimes, American Heart Association and the 'Dogs for Autism' program. We participated for the sixteenth consecutive year in Operation Christmas Child. Our PTA and SIC continue to provide tremendous support for our school financially and through a very strong volunteer program. Their dedication and commitment to our students, staff, and community make a tremendous contribution to the great success of our school. Bryson Elementary is a wonderful place for children and families to grow during the most critical years of their lives. We are privileged to serve a wonderful community and look forward to our continued partnership in shaping the next generation.

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ESEA/Federal Accountability Rating System

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
