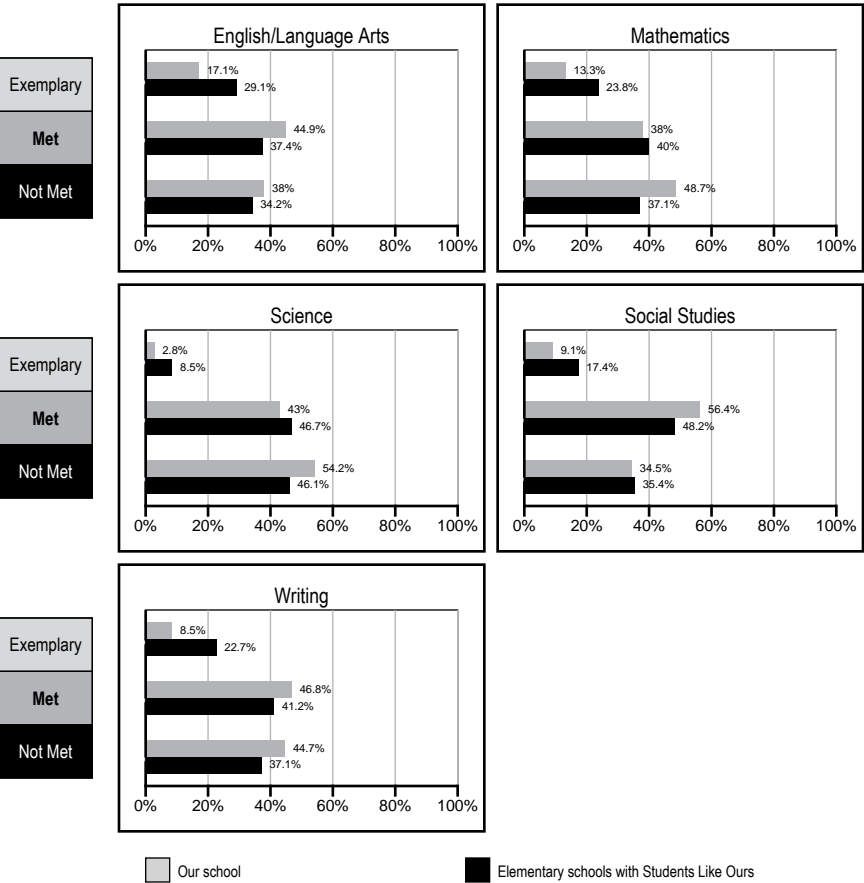

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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

This year Legacy Charter has focused on our school-wide theme, "Constructing Our Legacy." We have continued to build on that theme all year as we watched our students, teachers, and parents come together committed in finding success for all children. This focus, along with our Health and Wellness Initiative, has guided our decisions to strengthen our college-bound Legacy Community. We have experienced many successes this year. We have constructed a new elementary school and a new front office area at our Parker Campus. December brought the opening of a Health and Fitness Facility. Our school has been honored with many donations from our 2012 Nation-Wide Library Book Event, new speakers systems, and chairs for student assemblies. Our teachers have also been honored with grants to provide needed supplies and support in their classrooms. Mrs. Laura Soroachak was awarded National Board Certification this year to join three other teachers and Mrs. Alzine Smith was chosen as our Reading Teacher of the Year. Mrs. Vivian Means and Mrs. Anita Sanders were chosen as our Teachers of the Year for 2012-2013. Our teachers pursue their own education to grow through masters programs, school-wide book clubs and multiple staff development opportunities with our Instr. Coaches and other presenters. Project Class from Houston, TX has trained and assisted with our school-wide social skills program to place our students and faculty on a common ground with consistent language to guide our children to show their Legacy Lion Pride. Our students have had just as many successes. Every 9 Weeks, Honor Students are presented with Gold Honor Polos to acknowledge their hard work and achievement. We now have very active Student Councils. Students serve on student safety patrol, planning committees, and as peer mentors. Our older students have been involved with basketball, cross country, debate team, soccer, cheerleading, and track. Daily PE as well as Strings, Percussion, and Chorus continue to be a constant focus in the lives of our lions. Our high school students strive to participate in our early college program, partnering with Greenville Tech to help students earn college credit in high school. All classes have focused on the individual needs of our children through differentiation and by reaching out to other school personnel, and partnering college students, to work in small groups. Technology, hands-on math, leveled libraries, science experiments, and a gardening program are helping lessons come to life and build personal connections with the children. All students have the opportunities for multiple Field Experiences and travels each year. PASS Preparation Academy on Saturdays, Summer School Programs, YMCA, and Morning PASS Teams expand studies outside the classrooms. Our PTO has become integral parts of our leadership model and have assisted in the planning and the implementation of such activities as the Fall Festival, Spring Fling, Skate Nights, Chuck e Cheese Nights, Book Fairs, Santa Shops, Canned Food Drives, Pancake Breakfasts and keeping us focused on the needs of our children through building a strong Legacy family. Legacy Charter is a Title I School currently in its 2nd year of school improvement. With 9 out 13 objectives met, we did not meet AYP in 2011; however, we are extremely proud that our lions continued to grow this past year. Our children are learning every day! Our pledge to our parents and our community is that Legacy Charter School will provide a positive learning environment that allows ALL children to achieve and reach their greatest college-bound potential.
