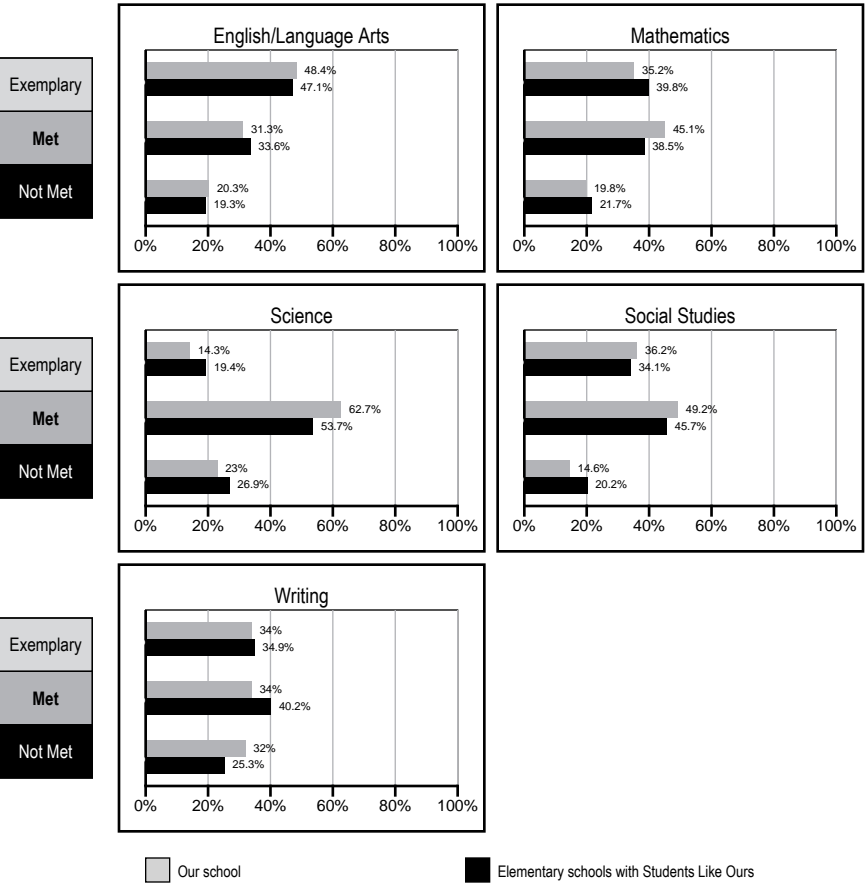

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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Accredit [a-kred'it]-to authorize; to certify; to believe in; to attribute; to furnish with credentials. This word has been very important in the life of HES this year. Each descriptor applies to Hollywood in many ways. State certification authorizes our team of highly qualified teachers to instruct our students. Six of those team members are Nationally Board Certified. Using Balanced literacy, Write from the Beginning and balanced math all students are taught according to their level of proficiency. High quality assessments, MAP and PASS are all indicators of success as scores continue to rise across the board. Students in grades 3-5 are challenged daily with our PowerPeriod. Open House, Curriculum Night and Kindergarten 101 allowed teachers to share the goals and expectations of HES with our parents.

We certify our commitment to our students by providing opportunities for them to shine. The Science Fair, Invention Convention and Science Showcase are prime examples of this. Students researched and experimented their way across the curriculum. Camping out with Reading and Math provided a fun filled evening of books and problem solving under the stars. Our Rockin'Reader incentive program enables students to earn rewards for reading outside the requirements of regular class work. Students star on our morning news , the Hollywood Rock Show.

We believe in a well rounded student. Hollywood supports many afterschool programs that make this happen. The National Honor Society sponsored a food and toy drive to help those less fortunate. Math Olympiads and the ORFF Ensemble encouraged students interested in mathematics and music by providing them with experiences to compete and perform. The Good News Club met weekly to equip children for a morally challenging world.

Hollywood can attribute a portion of its' success to community involvement. Parents and grandparents enjoyed breakfast with the students .Book fairs bring families out to share their love of reading. Students and community members joined together to salute veterans during our Veterans Day celebration. The South Carolina Department of Natural Resources offered tips on resource conservation . Last but certainly not least is our community volunteer program that bolsters our students' scores and confidence.

The final descriptor in our definition is "to furnish with credentials". Hollywood is currently accredited through the South Carolina Department of Education but our staff, students and administration went above and beyond to earn accreditation from AdvancED.

Yes, the word "Accredit" has been important to HES throughout the 2011-2012 school year and with the help and support of staff, students, parents and community we have defined it well.

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ESEA/Federal Accountability Rating System

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
