Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Mid-Carolina High School continued its long-standing tradition of excellence for the 2011-2012 school year.

The focus for school improvement has been, and will continue to be, student achievement. We were very pleased to see the number of students challenging themselves by taking Advanced Placement courses continue to rise from 2010-11 to 2011-12. Fifty-nine percent of our graduating class qualified for the LIFE scholarship at a two- or four-year institution, and they earned a total of \$2,236,489 in scholarships. Student achievement was also present in MCHS's academic extra-curricular activities. The Junior and Senior Beta Clubs had strong showings with several first place individual recognitions at their respective state conventions and the mock trial team placed as an alternate team to state at the Midlands Regional competition. The MCHS Student Council had a successful year as our student body president was inducted into the Terry A. McCoy Leadership Hall of Fame and the student council was named a Gold Honor Council by the SC Association of Student Councils.

MCHS is known for its strong athletic and fine arts programs. This year, almost every athletic team advanced to the state playoffs, and several students competed and won their events at the state level in track. Our football team went on to make the playoffs for the fifth year in a row. Our cheerleaders competed for a state title. For the seventh year in a row, our archery team placed first in the state competition and qualified to compete at the national level in Kentucky. The band competed in the state marching competition and once again earned the coveted Outstanding Performance Award. Our chorus students competed in many state activities, including the USC, Furman, Columbia College and Region Honor Choirs and All-State Chorus. Our art students also had an extraordinary year, with one student being selected to attend the residential program at the Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities, and three students selected for the summer program.

We will continue to strive toward engaging our students and reaching for the stars. It is important that we continue to develop strategies that will improve student achievement and use rigorous assessments tied to state standards. We are most proud of the role that our school plays in the community and we appreciate the support that we receive from parents and community members. We are also blessed with a dedicated faculty and staff, and their diligent efforts continue to develop as leaders in our profession and foster improved student achievement at MCHS.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
