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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Hemingway High School in the town of Hemingway in the Pee Dee region of South Carolina, serves grades 9 through 12. Student enrollment in 2011 – 2012 was 364 and included 87.6% African American, 8.25% White and 4.15% other ethnic groups. We continue our commitment to improve student achievement and to provide for our students the best education possible. Our goals for the 2011 – 2012 school year include continuation of the High Schools That Work program providing an instructional curriculum coach, participation in the district's early college program, participation of all certified staff in professional development sessions and book studies, and also providing incentives for teacher and student achievement. Other strategies for increasing student achievement include intensive reviews for HSAP immediately preceding the state tests, and use of MAP (Measures of Academic Progress). Hemingway High School provides staff development that will ensure proper use of data as it applies to student achievement. Two consultants, who are experts in testing strategies, were brought in to ensure the continued improvement in HSAP test scores. We continue to maintain data notebooks and a Data Wall. In addition, Hemingway High School was a recipient of a Palmetto Silver Award for the 2010 school year, a Palmetto Gold award for the 2011 school year, a Palmetto Gold Award for the 2012 school year. The School Report Card overall ratings for Hemingway High School has been progressively improving; At-Risk for the 2009 school year, Below Average for the 2010 school year, and Average for the 2011 school year. Hemingway High School is also the recipient of the HUG (Historically Underachieving Group) Award. Hemingway High has also been chosen as a School of Choice. We are proud to announce that of the students on the diploma track, 100% of those students taking HSAP passed. We commend our students and staff for their hard work during the past year; however, we continue to face various educational challenges. By working together, students, teachers, parents, administrators, and community members strive to fulfill our mission to prepare for success. In conclusion, we will continue to live by our motto, "Circling the Wagons, Moving from Good to Great".

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
