

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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Cario Middle School continues its tradition of excellence in academics, arts, athletics, and extracurricular activities. Cario is a highly successful middle school with a large campus, a small-school atmosphere, and huge opportunities for students.

On the 2011 state school report card, Cario earned an "Excellent" absolute rating and an "Excellent" growth rating. Our students have shown growth in reading, mathematics, and language usage through their Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) scores and have also consistently demonstrated mastery of rigorous academic standards.

Cario provides a quality honors program at all grade levels, as well as a structured system of interventions for students who need academic assistance. Students have opportunities to earn high school credits and may take exploratory courses such as Spanish, pre-engineering, health, drama, and fitness. Cario has one of the highest percentages of students identified as gifted and talented (GT) in CCSD. Cario students competed in academic challenges such as the SC Science Olympiad, American Mathematic Competition, CCSD Spellbound Spelling Bee, Quest Odyssey of the Mind, and National Geographic Geography Bee.

Cario students excel in both the arts and athletics. The Cario Chorus was recognized as Superior at the 2011 SC Festival, and Cario is the only school in South Carolina to have students selected to every regional and national honor choir since 2000. Thirty-one choral students made All-State. Orchestra students received superior ratings at the SC Concert Festival. Cario's Band received the state's Outstanding Performance Award for the tenth consecutive year and earned superior ratings at the SC Concert Festival. The Band also produced the most All-State representatives in the state. Visual artists have earned numerous awards, including first place ribbons in multiple state and county competitions. Drama students were involved in several productions during the year. The Drama team was awarded Best New Middle School at the state competition, and received a third place trophy. Cario teams competed in football, volleyball, cheerleading, basketball, soccer, tennis, swimming, golf, baseball, and softball. Student council sponsored multiple community service projects, and the yearbook staff produced a high-quality publication.

The Cario staff has participated in on-going professional development (PD) in order to meet the needs of our students. PD focused on active engagement in the learning process, inclusion strategies, multiple intelligence, instructional technology, positive behavioral interventions and supports, and interdisciplinary lesson development based on students' needs. Cario's staff includes twelve members who have earned National Board Certification and ten teachers with GT endorsements. Forty-one percent of faculty members hold advanced degrees. Cario Middle School uses the Making Middle Grades Work model to implement positive changes in our school. We recognize the importance of high expectations, rigorous academics, and a safe, supportive learning environment for all students.

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ESEA/Federal Accountability Rating System

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
