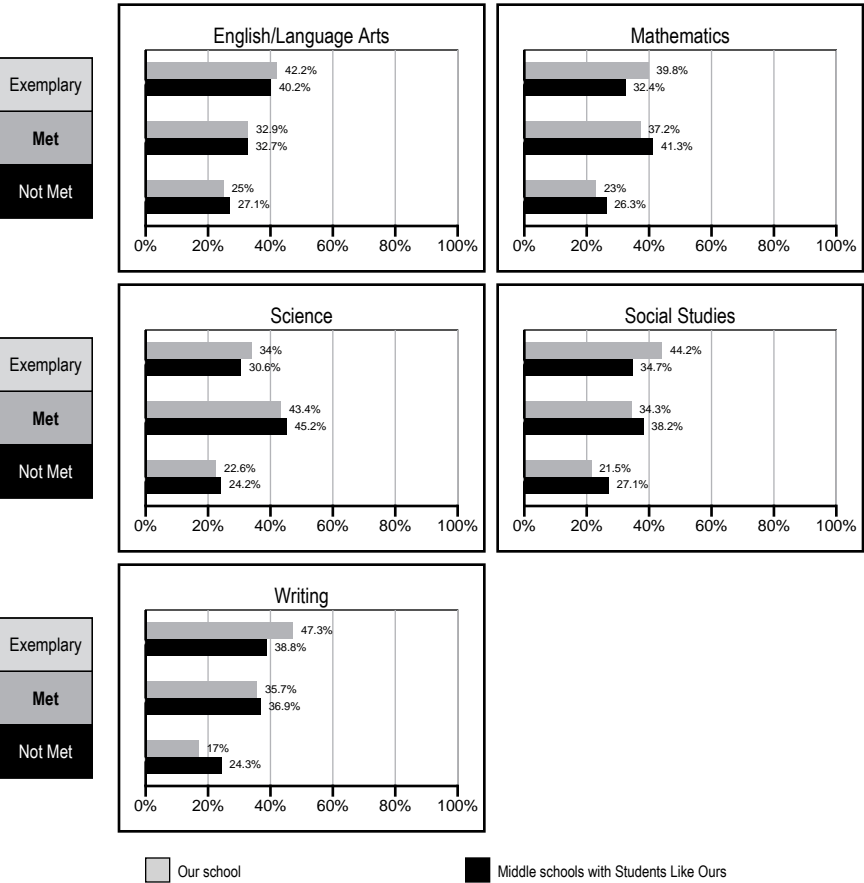

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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Alston Middle School, located off of Highway 78 in Summerville, SC, is an outstanding arts-infused school where the academics, arts, and athletics come together to promote student growth and create a wonderful learning environment. Alston Middle School offers a rigorous, relevant, and challenging curriculum that advances the learning of all of our students. We are dedicated to providing a safe environment in order to maximize the academic, creative, athletic, and emotional potential of each student.

We are proud of our students, staff, parents, business partners, and community members who have supported our efforts this year. Our combined efforts earned us many awards and enabled our students to grow. AMS received the Palmetto Silver Award for student achievement for the 2010-2011 school year. The AMS Girls' Robotics Team won 1st place for robot design at the 2012 Robotics Competition. The AMS QUEST team won 2nd place in Math-Level 1 (6th grade), 2nd place in Social Studies-Level 1 (6th grade), and 2nd place in the Overall Level 1. Furthermore, a healthy lifestyle and nutrition program (CHEFS) was implemented through the support of the Greater Summerville/ Dorchester County Chamber of Commerce.

Students at AMS also enjoy many opportunities to enhance their educational experience through the arts, sports, and electives. We offer classes in piano, guitar, dance, physical education, band, strings, chorus, visual arts, theater, and Spanish. Also, students have the opportunity to participate in QUEST academic teams, Robotics, the Geography Bee, and additional clubs, sports, and activities. The AMS theater students performed the musical, Fiddler on the Roof. Strings students performed in several public concerts and won numerous awards. The AMS Concert Choir received an Excellent Rating at the SCMEA Choral Festival. The AMS Wrestling Team placed second this season. Our AMS Girl's Softball Team played an undefeated regular season and placed 2nd overall in the tournament.

For the 2011-2012 school year, we worked toward meeting the needs of each individual child. Data collected via various means was used by caring teachers to determine overall and individual student needs. The results of these diagnostic measures help us to implement interventions and differentiation in all subject areas resulting in student learning and growth. Our plans for the 2012-2113 school year include maximizing instruction and increasing communication.

Like many schools in our district, we face challenges. We operate with fewer funds, tackle new initiatives, and address the obstacles of a rapidly changing world. Armed with a formidable PTA Board, a fully-engaged teaching staff, a School Improvement Council, and a host of community stakeholders, our school will continue to radiate and develop into a brilliant learning community.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
