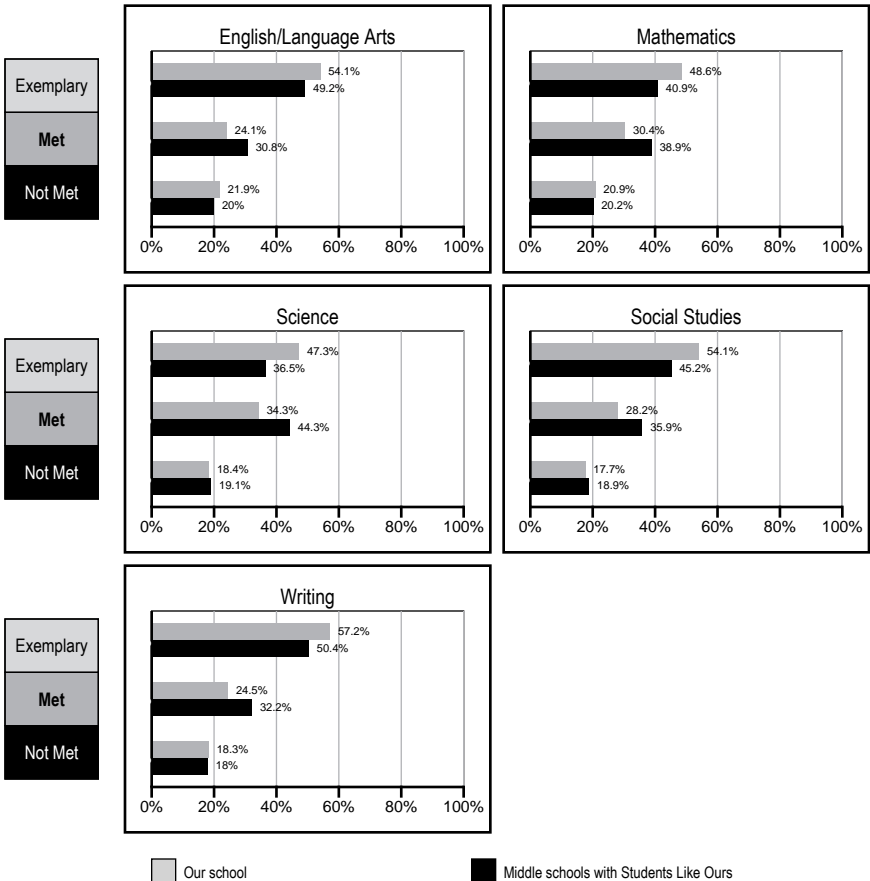

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## Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Crayton Middle School serves 6th through 8th grade students, and is located in the heart of the Forest Acres community. Our community members and parents acknowledge our students as a commodity and give an extensive amount of support to the achievements of our school.

Crayton achieved many honors during the 2011 – 2012 school year including the Palmetto Gold Award, the state's highest award for student achievement. 105 students were named Middle School Scholars. 72 students were named South Carolina Junior Scholars earning a PSAT score of 50 or higher on any one of the three subtests in reading, math and writing. 83 8th grade students were inducted into the National Junior Honor Society earning a cumulative GPA of 3.75 or higher in all classes as well as achievements in character and leadership skills. 100% of our students passed the End of Course math exams, many students were Duke Tip recipients, and our MathCounts team placed third in the region. Thanks to our dedicated teachers, Crayton was one of three schools in the nation to have the honor of linking via satellite with NASA astronauts on the space station ISS. Students enjoyed asking questions of the astronauts and utilizing those questions and answers to enhance what they were learning in their 7th grade Math classes.

Crayton has celebrated many successes this year in athletics as well as the visual and performing arts. The Crayton Cavalier football team earned the district championship for the fourth time in a row, and our 6th grade track team was awarded first place in the district. 82 of our students are athletically talented enough to have earned positions on Junior Varsity and Varsity sports teams at the high school level. Students earned awards at the South Carolina State Fair and at the Richland County School District One Art Exhibit. Chorus students earned an excellent rating at the SCMEA Middle School Choral Festival.

Crayton completed its seventh year as an International Baccalaureate Middle School Programme (IBMYP) school and its third year as a Making Middle Grades Work (MMGW) site, which is a comprehensive improvement framework that will facilitate Crayton's ongoing effort to achieve and exceed district and state goals. Crayton continues to build on our Positive Behavior Intervention and Support (PBIS) program that provides the structure and clear expectations necessary to improve and enhance the overall learning environment. Students also participated in incentive programs that promote a strong sense of community.

Our dedicated faculty and staff is comprised of highly-qualified and dedicated individuals. Teachers work collaboratively to provide effective and engaging learning experiences for all students. Teachers practice common planning and assessment to maintain high expectations. By analyzing data, including data from MAP testing and PASS testing, teachers are able to determine strengths and weaknesses in instruction so as to continuously make improvements.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
