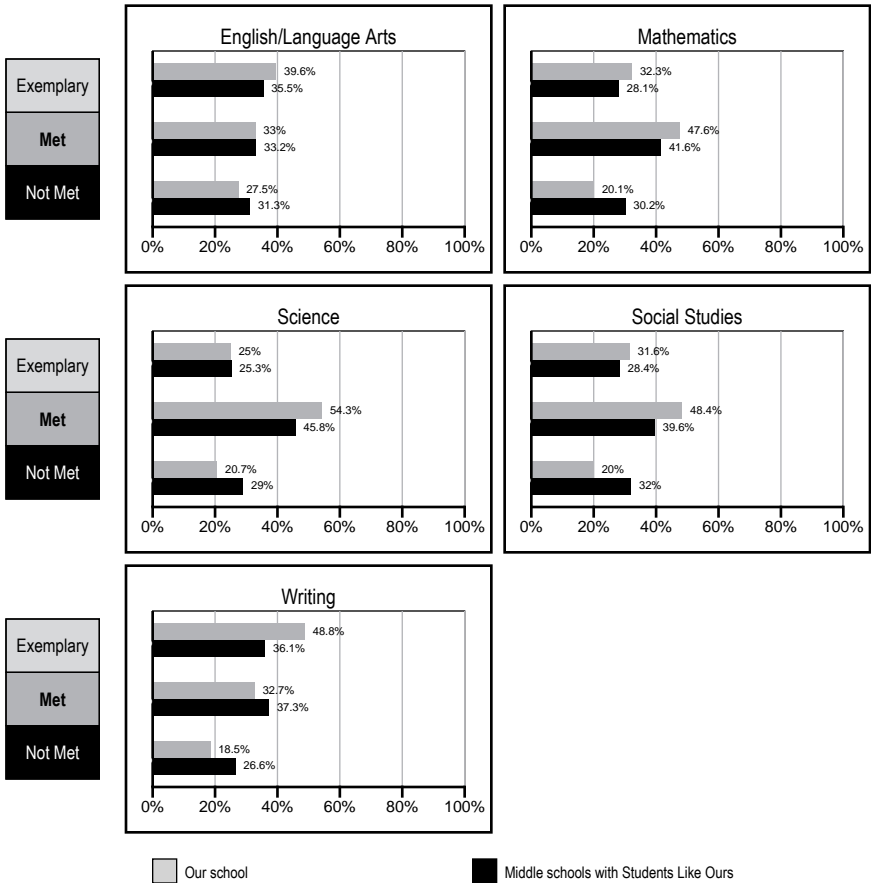

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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

All teachers are currently engaged in on-going, professional development regarding formative and summative assessments and elevating the essentials - improving students' ability to read, write, and discuss. All faculty members have also received intense, on-going training in working in Professional Learning Communities, creating high quality assessments, and providing feedback to students. Power Period continues as an additional 60 minute course in which students have the opportunity for enrichment, second chances at academic success, and remediation. SMS received a grant worth \$210,000 for professional development for all math and science teachers which is designed to assist students in reading to learn in their content area.

Saluda Middle School continues to offer courses for high school credit: Algebra I Honors, English I Honors, Computer Applications, Real World Math Applications, and Real World Reading Applications, and PE. End-Of-Course (EOC) Examination Program results were extremely successful with 100% of students passing Algebra I, 98% of students passing English I, and over half of the students taking the Algebra exams scored an A.

For the second time, our school participated in the Regional Science Fair and 30 students placed in their division. SMS held the following extracurricular activities: Youth Coalition, Glee Club, ROAR Television Production Crew, School Improvement Council, BETA club, yearbook staff, marching and jazz band, percussion ensemble, athletics, student council, and Fellowship of Christian Athletes. At the state convention, BETA club members placed 2nd in the Tower of Power. Two students were identified as South Carolina Junior Scholars, and two students qualified for the South Carolina Honor Band.

Saluda Middle School continues to utilize additional staff through a substantial grant. We employ a School Resource Officer, Parent Liaison, Truancy Officer, and Behavioral Health Counselor. Also through the grant, every student participated in the Olweus Bullying Prevention Program. With the assistance of our Career Specialist, Over 350 students benefited by venturing out into the community to get a firsthand look at the job market and over 80% of our students completed their Individualized Graduation Plans. In addition, we held multiple career days sponsored by Piedmont Technical College and local business leaders, military personnel, and community members.

This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target.
