

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REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

The staff at C.E. Williams Middle School seeks innovative and effective ways to challenge and support the 640 students who grow and learn as they progress from wide-eyed sixth graders to seasoned eighth graders ready for high school. The staff is comprised of 44 certified faculty members and 12 classified employees. Teachers and support staff members consider the many facets of our middle schoolers' lives and creatively engaged these students in programs and activities to positively affect them. This year, students were organized into teams, which had the same four teachers; research has shown this structure helps students feel more connected and supported.

Academic interventions, implemented this year to foster student success, included three different literacy programs, two math curricula, an organization support group and increased Saturday Academy tutoring sessions. In addition to adding a high school credit bearing English 1 class, expanded enrichment opportunities were offered through newly created clubs, robotics, eCybermission, and Quest competition teams. Several teachers are currently acquiring the endorsement for Gifted and Talented education and all have taken part in staff development on cognitive engagement.

Fund raising began to offset the costs of the annual Kanuga trip taken by sixth graders to North Carolina for science-based learning; we do not want any student excluded from the trip due to financial reasons, so, for the first time, plan to take all sixth graders. Senteo Clickers and Inspire calculators were purchased to engage students and effectively incorporate technology into instruction.

To increase all students' exposure to experiences outside of the traditional curriculum, every staff member sponsored a club offered during the day. Local professionals shared their vocational expertise through a career fair, which returned to C.E. after a multi-year hiatus. The arts program grew with the arrival of a dance/theater arts teacher and the Caribbean sounds emanating from the steel drums class. We also embarked on the yearlong process of becoming an Arts in Basic Curriculum School seeking the grants offered to ABC schools.

Students' emotional health was the focus of Overcoming Obstacles, a program implemented to help students make wise choices. A part-time guidance counselor was brought on staff to facilitate small groups of students working through grief, frustration, conflict, or learning how to fit into a blended family. Faculty members attended professional development to prepare them to recognize and address bullying, student depression, child neglect, and abuse. "Total Fitness" challenged students to increase their physical health while talking through concerns as they worked out.

Through the 2011 School Climate Survey, parents expressed a desire for more communication with the school. As a result, teachers began sending home information via newly created "Mustang Message" postcards, and the principal sent out a recorded message each Sunday night with reminders, news, and calendar updates.

C.E. Williams continues to be characterized by achievement and compassion; our students, staff, and parents make our school a great place to learn and grow.
