## Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

The mission of Summerton Early Childhood Center is to educate the “whole” child by partnering with parents and the community. We believe that is our mission as a school and community to ensure that all students are well-prepared academically, socially, and emotionally in order to become successful and productive lifelong citizens. Currently, we are a 2010-2013 “Red Carpet” School recipient, accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, and have earned NAEYC (National Association for the Education of Young Children) accreditation.

Improving instruction and enhancing student achievement continues to be top priority goals at Summerton Early Childhood Center. Our instructional staff, parents, community members, and administrators collaborate continually to seek methods to improve instruction and enhance student achievement.

Summerton Early Childhood Center implemented several learning strategies during the year that aided in student success and achievement. We implemented a school-wide writing curriculum, “Writing to Win” and integrated the Continuous Improvement Model into our curriculum. We continue to [provide our students with researched-based curriculum (STC Kits) in science and the best practices in ELA and Math. Benchmark assessments are also administered three times throughout the year. These assessments aid teachers in guiding instruction.

Parents and guardians have been offered a wide variety of educational opportunities and parenting workshops that have provided them with skills to be actively involved in their child’s education on a regular basis, through Rotary sponsored Literacy Night and Title I Parenting Programs. Our PTSO continues to sponsor numerous activities which include: Back 2 School Bash, Fall Festival, Donuts for Dads/Muffins for Moms, and Grits for Grannies. The PTSO also sponsored several service learning projects such as Relay for Life, St. Jude Math-a-thon, and JROTC Canned Food Drive. These events opened the door for parents and the community to become more involved with SECC. We continue to solicit your support.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target.
