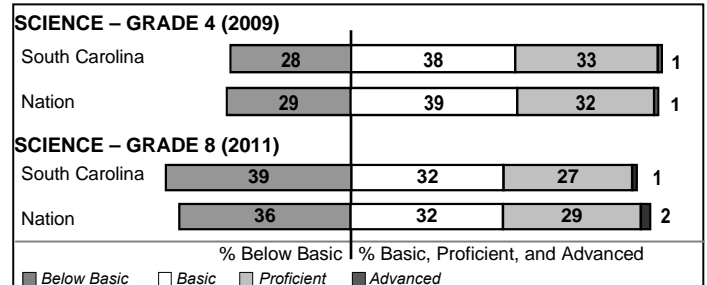

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

“Learning. Serving. Leading” are the words that summarize our district’s vision: “Ware Shoals School District 51 is a district where students are meaningfully engaged in LEARNING in a safe, intellectually stimulating, and challenging environment, and students are well prepared for a variety of post-graduation options. Students find happiness and personal fulfillment in SERVING their school and community, using their talents and energy to make a positive difference in their own lives and the lives of others. Students are ethical and trustworthy, and they are committed and confident in LEADING themselves and others along the path of lifelong learning and continuous improvement.

This year was a year of self-reflection as we successfully completed the national accreditation process. Employees, students, parents, business leaders, and community members assisted us in critically evaluating our vision, strategies, priorities, leadership, programs, and resources. The process provided the district with a clear and compelling direction for implementing changes to continue moving toward excellence. Our goals for improvement are identified in the District Strategic Plan and School Renewal Plans.

We are proud of our students and the schools they attend. Last year Ware Shoals Primary and Elementary received Palmetto Gold Awards and Ware Shoals High received a Palmetto Silver for academic achievement. Ware Shoals Elementary received an additional Silver Award for success in closing the achievement gap. Ware Shoals Primary and Ware Shoals Elementary also made a grade of ‘A’ on federal accountability standards, and Ware Shoals High / Junior high together had a rating of ‘B.’ Ware Shoals Elementary was nominated for the prestigious “National Blue Ribbon” award. All schools gave students an opportunity to give back to the community in a variety of ways. Recycling projects, beautification projects, Community Clean-up Day, canned food drives and Christmas Is for Kids served as important avenues for service and for character education.

Several initiatives were launched in order to improve instruction, safety, and district operations: The district implemented Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) in order to strengthen our focus on student learning and student success. Our PLCs continued the Curriculum Mapping process while learning about Common Core State Standards which are to be fully implemented in the 2013-14 school year. District leaders worked closely with law enforcement and emergency response personnel to review and revise emergency plans. Steps were taken to increase security in each school. The district completed all requirements of the Prevention and Risk Reduction program, earning an award for “Excellence in Risk Control.”

We continue to face economic challenges. Even though some state funding has been restored, mandated increases and a decrease in enrollment over the past few years has prevented the district from restoring cuts to programs and staff. In these challenging times, we continue to be grateful to parents, community members, local businesses, and alumni who support our schools and our programs for the benefit of our students.
