**Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating**

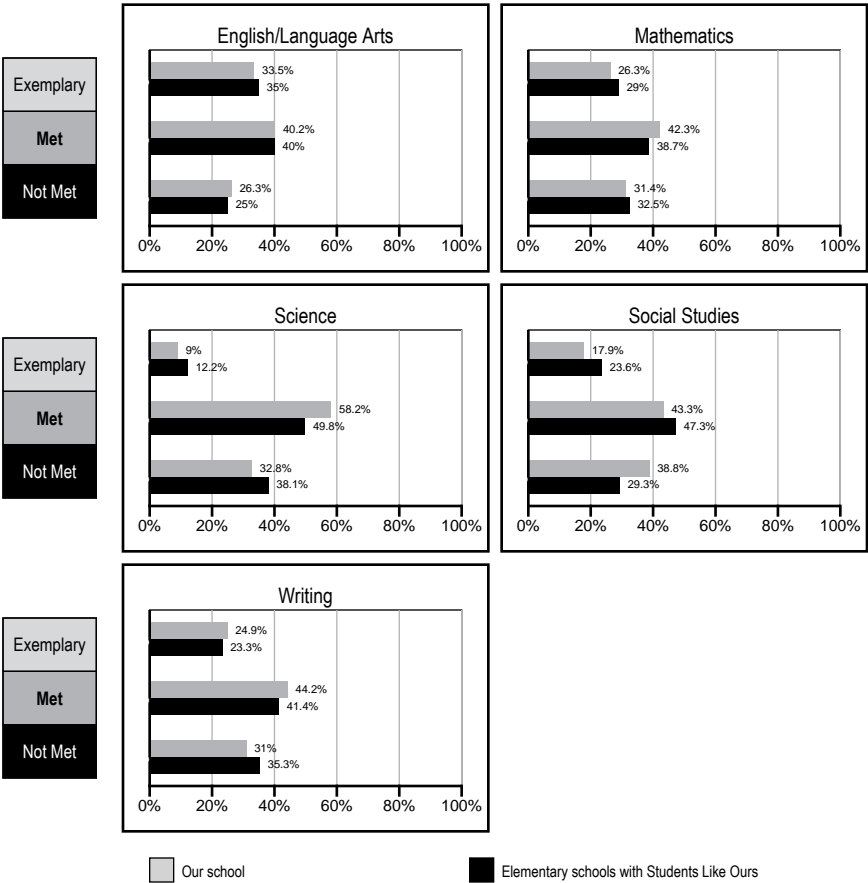

## Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

The focus for our school this year was on improving student achievement. We strived daily for all of our students to excel academically and prepare socially to compete in a global society. To that end, the faculty and staff at Rice Elementary School has implemented the Common Core State Standards in English language arts and mathematics. Teachers met regularly to plan effective, engaging lessons that address higher order thinking skills and ensure that lessons are differentiated to address individual student needs. Our grade level teams, along with the administration, met weekly in Professional Learning Communities. Through these PLC meetings, analysis of the individual and class data helped identify areas of strength, areas that needed more emphasis, and individuals needing more specific interventions.

We implemented Ranger Time this year to address a specific area of concern. Ranger Time is a science lab that incorporates hands-on science instruction by the science lab teacher and regular classroom teacher. In addition to Ranger Time, we have a reading interventionist to focus on students in grades 3-5 who read below grade level. We have continued to provide Reading Recovery for struggling readers in first grade as well as additional reading support for kindergarten and second grade students.

Rice Elementary continues to be a proud PBIS School focused on teaching and acknowledging positive behavior. This year our school, in conjunction with two other district elementary schools, was awarded a 21st Century Grant to fund an after school program for qualifying students in grades 3-5. Our school was also awarded a Champions of the Environment Grant to expand our "Roots and Shoots Garden" to include a Meadow Garden as well as bluebird house with a live camera feed to continue to enrich our science instruction.

Rice has continued to focus on balanced literacy instruction in all grade levels. Incorporating technology has also been a focus by introducing iPads, Odyssey Labs, and the continued use of SmartBoards. Rice students participated in service learning activities throughout the year to give back to our community. This year our projects included United Way, Relay for Life, Jump Rope for Heart, and March of Dimes.

At Rice we are continuing to strengthen the relationships between school and home. Each grade level held a parent involvement activity within the first nine weeks of school. We also had Grandparents Day, Food Lion Math Night, PTO meetings, musical performances, School Art Night, Family Nights Out, a Spring Carnival, 100 Book Club, as well as monthly Birthday Lunch celebrations.

Eleanor S. Rice Elementary School is committed to making a positive difference in the lives of all of our students. We believe the dedication and talents of our teachers, staff, parents, and community members will empower our students to be respectful, responsible, and productive citizens.

This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target.
