Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating

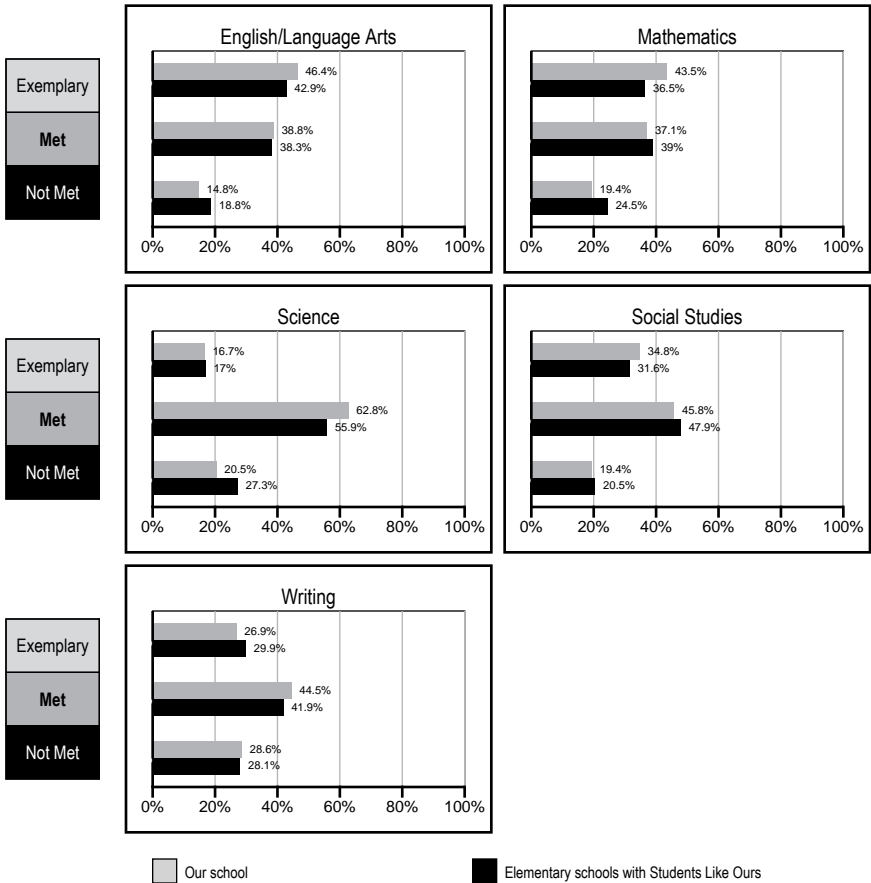

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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Liberty Elementary School (LES) has had a military theme for the 2012-2013 school year and our focus has been on leadership. We have worked hard to teach our students that "Leadership Encourages Success". This year our entire faculty read the book "The Leader in Me" and worked hard to teach our students the 7 Habits of Leadership. We believe it is imperative that our students learn what it means to be a leader and that these skills will help to ensure their success, regardless of what profession they choose in life.

Our faculty, staff, and administration work diligently to provide a safe, caring, and academically challenging environment for all 550 of our students. Our goal is for each of them to learn and reach their full potential. We are proud of our strong history of academic success. LES has won the Palmetto Gold and Silver Award every year since its inception in 2002. LES has also received an Absolute Rating of Excellent and an Improvement Rating of Excellent on our School Report Card for the past three years. We have achieved these accolades through the continuous professional development of our teachers. Our teachers are always seeking new and effective strategies such as: Thinking Maps, Literacy By Design, Café, manipulatives, Every Day Math, Classworks, science kits, guided reading, Accelerated Reader, Project Read, Write From The Beginning, STEM, and Reading Recovery.

At Liberty Elementary we not only focus on educating the mind, we work hard to develop the whole child. This year we continued to use the Positive Behavior Interventions and Support (PBIS) program here at LES. We also continued our partnership with the Young Appalachian Musicians (YAMs) program. This program had numerous students staying after school to learn to play the banjo, guitar, and fiddle. Our guidance counselor taught the Seven Habits of Leadership in monthly classroom guidance lessons. She also has a helper named Dolly Mae, our very own school dog, who is always there to make any student feel better. We continued the BARK and Fix-It-Fido programs that bring dogs into the school to work with students who struggle with reading and to assist with bullying. LES also partnered with the Feed A Hungry Child Program to provide food over the weekend for numerous needy students. Finally, we continued to offer Breakfast In The Classroom for our students.

Parent communication and support is essential to the success of any school.

Therefore, use a variety of forms of communication to inform parents of how their child is doing in school. We communicate through weekly folders, the Parent Link phone system, newsletters, agendas, interim reports, and report cards. We also offer a variety of ways for parents to become involved in their child's education. Some of the opportunities for our school involvement include the School Improvement Council, PTO, parent nights, and the volunteer program. The school, family, and community must share the educational responsibility to produce students who are effective members of society. In July 2013, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
