Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating

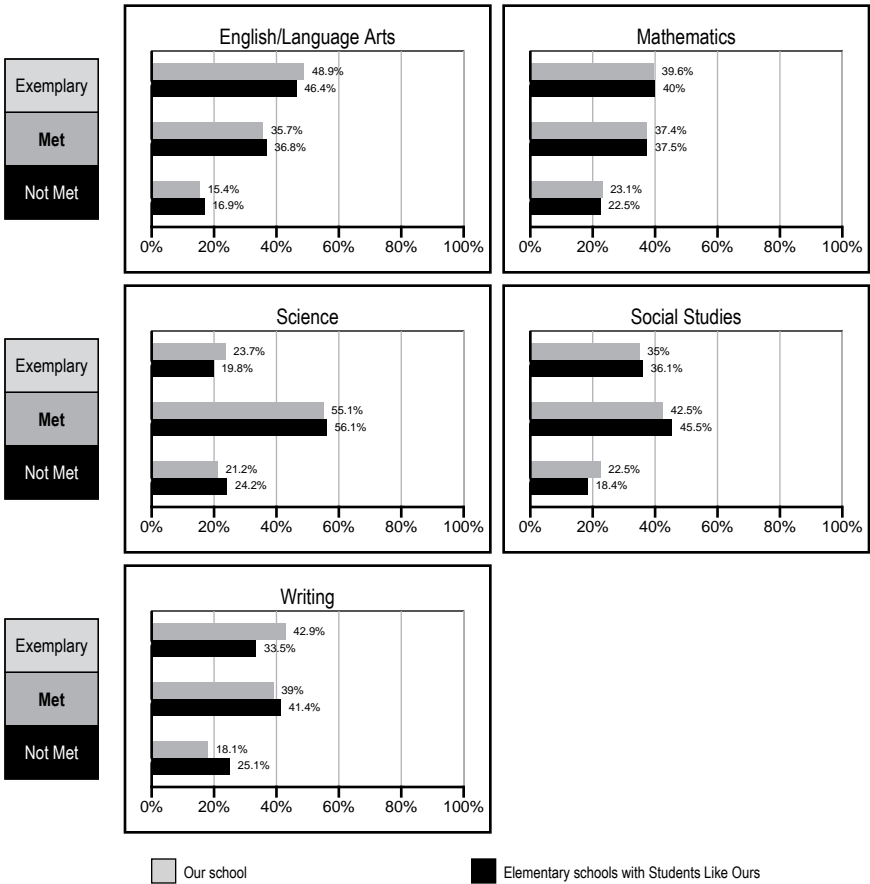

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## Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

At Hollywood Elementary School (HES) our mission is to provide engaging educational opportunities that encourage positive academic and social growth. We want to empower students to be life-long learners who are Respectful, Organized, Cooperative, Knowledgeable, and Successful. Our students are expected to show that Hollywood ROCKS at all times and in all instances, and they reap the rewards when they do. To achieve these ideals, HES is a Positive Behavior Interventions and Support (PBIS) school in its third year of implementation. It is a priority of our school community to reinforce positive behaviors while constantly teaching our school-wide expectations. This initiative coupled with student leadership opportunities and community service projects helps to attain our mission.

At HES our students are not the only ones who show that Hollywood ROCKS. Our faculty is highly qualified and works diligently to achieve the mission and vision of HES, providing exceptional instruction in every classroom. This year our school fully implemented the Common Core State Standards at all grade levels. HES fully implemented Balanced Literacy in all grades, Pre-K through 5th, and math teachers employed a problem solving based hands-on program during Balanced Math. Seven of our teachers are Nationally Board Certified. Mrs. Kim Shealy was selected as our 2012-2013 Teacher of the Year. Mrs. Jennifer Thomas, Instructional Coach, earned her Master's in Administration. Mrs. Daylene Pitts was selected to participate in a field study this summer in California by the National Endowment for Humanities.

Our students are constantly ROCKIN for excellence and are offered many school sponsored activities and opportunities to do so. This year students participated in such endeavors both during and after school. During school students helped produce HES' early morning news show, The Hollywood Rock Show. Students also became a part of Town Hall meetings that celebrated success on the MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) test. On Fridays, all students took part in the Olweus Bullying Prevention Program. After school students were able to join Math Olympiads to further their math interests, the Honors Choir and Percussion Ensemble to pursue music, and the Lucky Leaf 4-H Club. HES has a chapter of the National Elementary Honor Society that sponsored school wide events emphasizing community service this year. The Good News Club welcomed 140 members during the year, helping students deal with a morally challenging world.

Our strong community also helped to foster growth at HES. Parents joined us for Open House and Curriculum Night. Parents and grandparents enjoyed breakfast with our students and had fun learning more about Science during our Science Showcase. HES has a dedicated parent organization, PACE (Parents Association Concerned about Education), that helped provide agendas, field trips, general supplies, and along with the community, provided new shelving for our school library.

Staff, students, parents, and community all work together to keep Hollywood a ROCKIN place to be. HES will continue to strive for excellence and with the support of everyone involved we are sure to achieve it.

In July 2013, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
